Mrs. William Ogden Coleman played most admirably Mrs. Pampinelli, the director of the amateurs. Her noble manner and gestures, and especially her readiness to "take a bow" convulsed the audience. Mr. Ritter was most excellently portrayed by Donald Morrison.
