

Kenilworth Police Get Powerful Car for Speedy Work

The new Kenilworth police car, a Hupmobile "Eight" roadster, was delivered late last week and is now in service, it was announced last Monday. The new machine was ordered purchased by the Kenilworth Village board some time ago and the police committee of that organization was instructed to make the purchase whenever it had decided upon the machine most suited to the department's needs. At that time it was stated that due to the fact that thieves now operate in high powered machines it would be practically impossible for the Village police to apprehend fugitive bandits should the occasion arise, because of the slowness of the equipment formerly used.

The addition of the new patrol car places the Kenilworth police department on a par with most of the north shore organizations. Beacon lights placed at various points throughout the village for the purpose of signaling to officers out on patrol, the addition of tear gas bombs and bomb projectors, the purchasing recently of a new motorcycle, and the addition of several men, have all been factors involved in a general program of maintaining the department on a basis of the highest efficiency.
