The society was formed about seven years ago at the instigation of Dr. Rufus B. Dr. Stolp was president of the society in the two years succeeding its formation.

The present officers of the club are as follows: Warren Pease, president; Frank Ketcham, secretary and treasurer; Leon B. Allen, assistant secretary and treasurer; and Miss Helen Sears, daughter of the founder of Kenilworth, historian. Mrs. Joseph Sears, wife of the Kenilworth founder, is honorary president, having been accorded that title by the club at its formation.


