

"Russia Today" Will Be Shown in Movie Films

The first uncensored motion picture of conditions in Russia in the tenth year of the Soviet regime will be shown at the Chicago Playhouse, 410 S. Michigan avenue, beginning Sunday, December 11. It is called "Russia Today—the Land Nobody Knows" and was produced during a survey of the American Student Delegation, this past summer.

So much propaganda has reached America regarding the Soviet Union that no one seems to have any idea about what is actually taking place there, and Russia today stands as the enigma of Europe. Without taking sides, "Russia Today" depicts the true state of affairs, both the good and the bad.

The American Student Delegation was composed of members of social and economic organizations of about forty of the leading American colleges and universities. They received carte blanche from the Soviet authorities and were permitted to photograph whatever they wished, without interference in any way from the Government.
