issued by the Automobile Club of Il-  
linois through its president, Si. Mayer.  
"Let your New Year's resolution in-  
clude some of the finer mannerisms  
of motoring, giving greater regard for  
the pedestrian and especially for the  
child. Resolve to make 1928 your best  
driving year—to help reduce the ac-  
cident toll by refraining from doing  
that which is responsible for its cause.

"Resolve to be a 100% sane driver,  
a credit to motorism, and that you will  
not be a party to any accident if with-  
in your power to prevent it—also that  
you will do your level best to instruct  
and show your fellow motorists to do  
likewise," declared Mr. Mayer.

"These and many other phases of  
safety can be incorporated into your  
manual of motorist resolutions, which  
if adopted and strictly conformed to  
can do much to make 1928 one of the  
safest since the advent of the auto-  
mobiles."
