### Masked Bandit Robs Couple in Highway Hold-up

Marshall Retzinger, of Northbrook and Miss Marie Thalman, living on Washington avenue, west of Ridge avenue, Wilmette, were held up and robbed, Thursday evening of last week, while driving in the north part of the village.

The hold-up occurred about 10 o'clock, on Locust road, near Reinwald avenue. Retzinger said he passed the road at which he desired to turn, and it was as he stopped to turn about that a masked bandit stepped to the running board of the car, and, with drawn revolver, relieved him of what cash he had, about \$10, and demanded Miss Thalman's jewelry.

The young woman had taken occasion to slip her wrist watch and rings off while the hold-up man was busy relieving Retzinger of his money, and thereby saved them.

The bandit, judging from his manner of speech, was a negro, Retzinger says. His face was completely hidden by the mask.

Retzinger, believing the hold-up had been staged in Winnetka, reported the incident to the police of that village, who, in turn notified the police.
