LECTURE ON LABRADOR

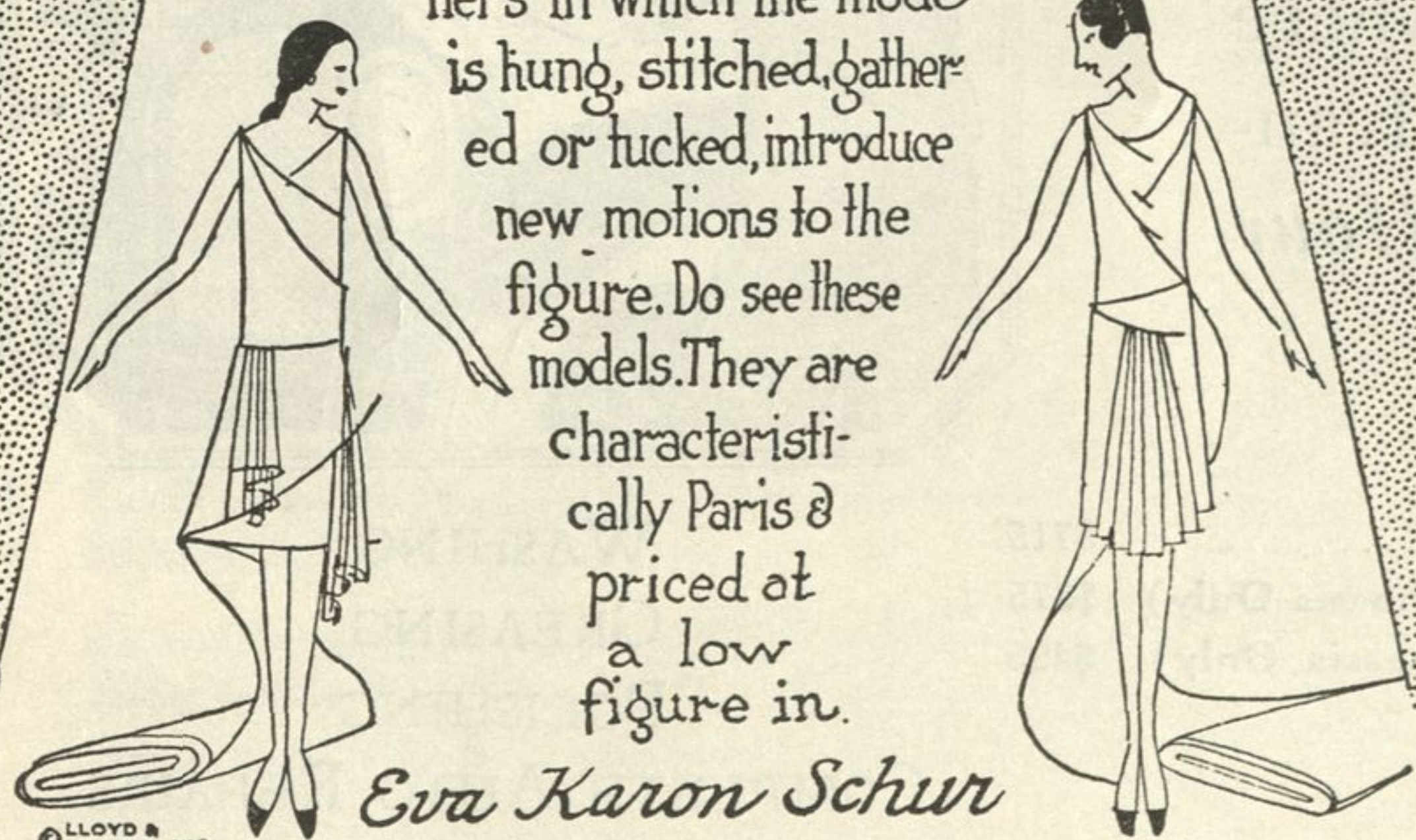
