Students to Study Newspaper Methods in European Cities

Newspapering in Europe for college students, teachers and writers, an educational experiment originated last year by Director H. F. Harrington of the Medill School of Journalism of Northwestern university, will this summer become a pilgrimage to the International Press exhibition at Cologne, Germany, to Bruges, Belgium, where in 1475 Caxton printed the first book in English, and to other foreign literary and journalistic shrines, it is announced.

The party, limited to 25 members, will be called the Blue Pencil Club Abroad. It is to be directed by Prof. Leland D. Case, formerly of the staff of the Paris Herald; Professor Lawrence Martin, editorial writer, The Evanston News-Index, and Harry Hillman of Wilmette, former editor of the Inland Printer. The group will leave Montreal June 29, returning to New York August 24.

Foreign methods of news gathering and newspaper production will be studied, and lectures by European newspapermen on economic and political situations abroad are being arranged. Visits will be made to "The Scotsman" at Edinburgh, the London "Daily Mail" and "Le Matin" and overseas editions of the New York "Herald Tribune" and Chicago "Tribune" in Paris.


