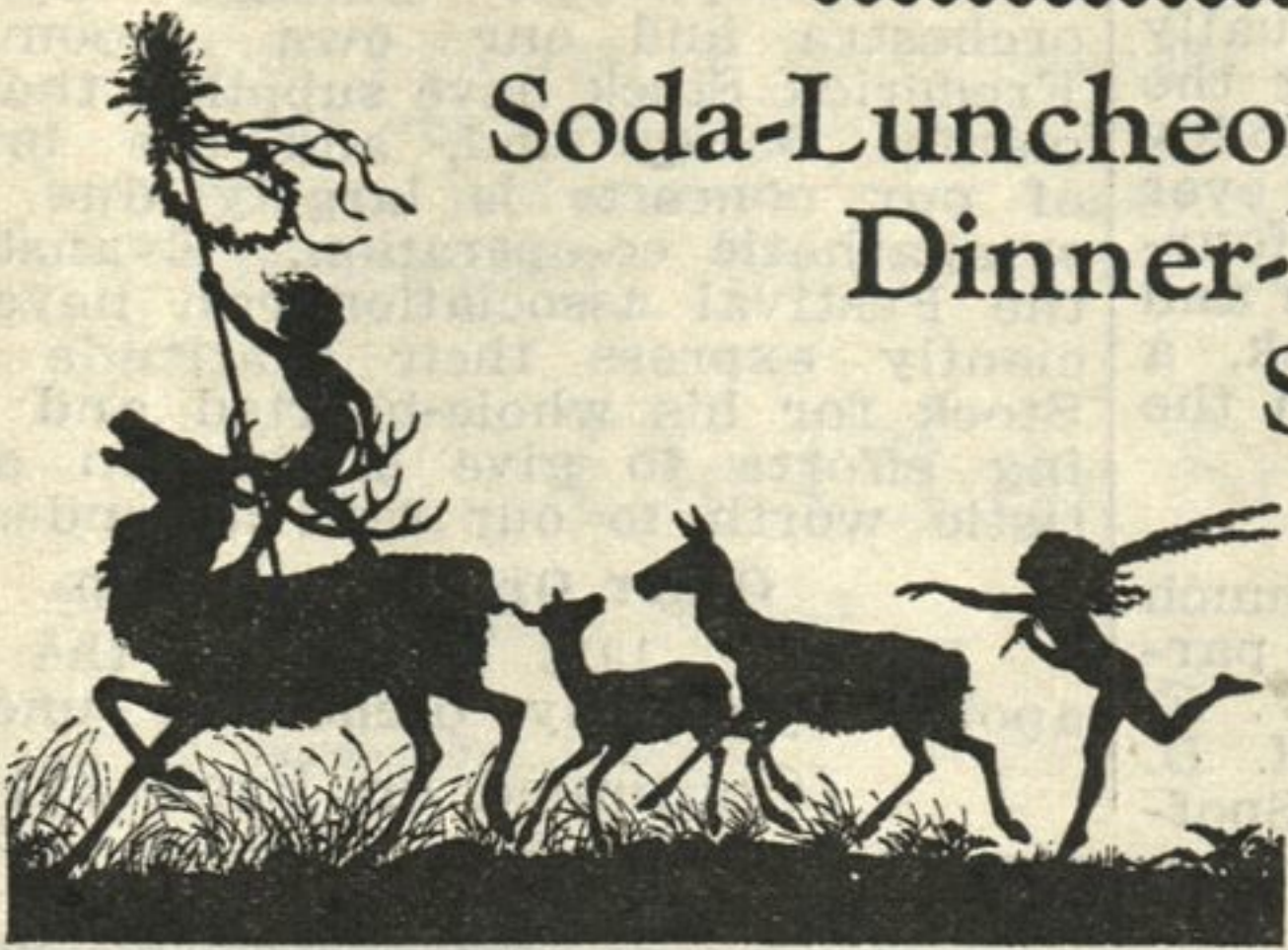


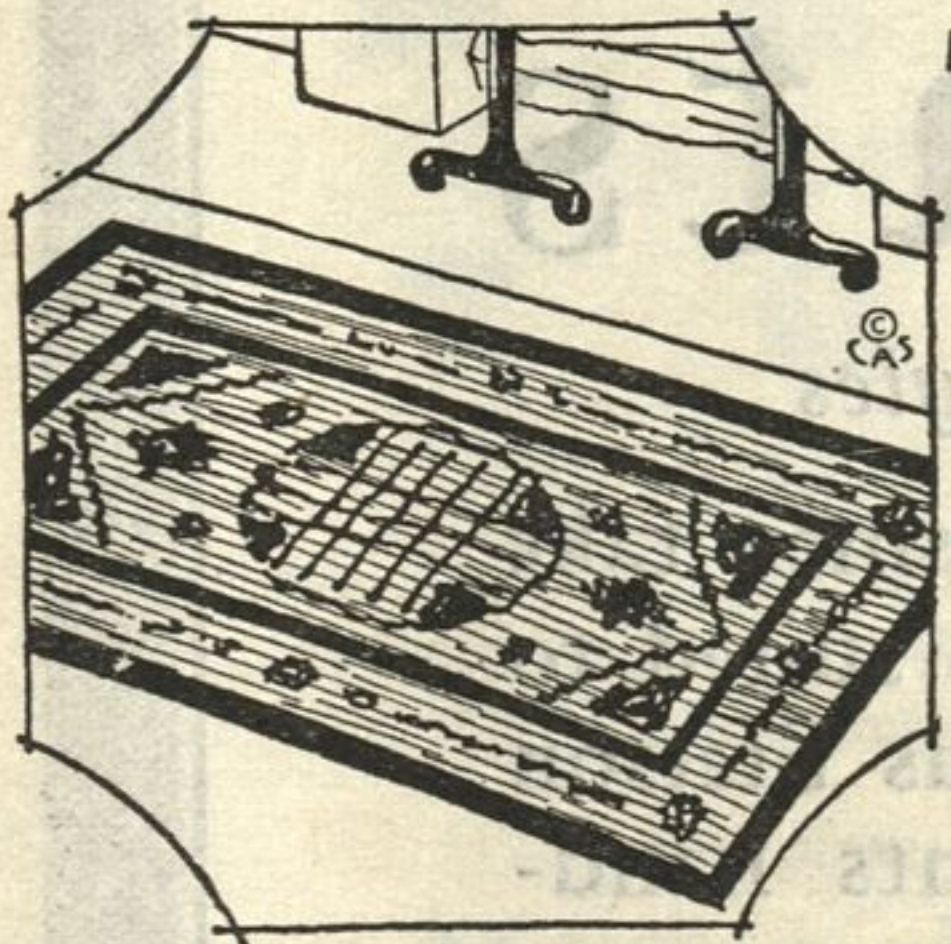

## Odd Fellows Help Evanston Lodge in Birthday Festivity

Thirty-five members of Evanston Lodge No. 673, I. O. O. F., surprised A. T. Sherman Lodge No. 892, I. O. O. F., of Wilmette, last week Thursday evening, with a visit. It was the forty-eighth anniversary of Evanston lodge and they brought a huge birthday cake with forty-eight candles on it. Rev. Orvis F. Jordan, chaplain of the Grand lodge and a member of Evanston lodge, accompanied the visitors and delivered a very interesting and inspiring address on Odd Fellowship. A number of the Evanston members also responded with appropriate remarks. Cake, sandwiches, coffee, and cigars were served.

Programs have been received of the meeting of District association No. 37 of Wisconsin, which is to be entertained by Hahnemann lodge No. 180 at Fort Atkinson, Wis., Saturday, April 14, and at which A. T. Sherman lodge is to exemplify the Third Degree. Supper is to be served at 6 o'clock in the Congregational church, by the Fort Atkinson Rebekah lodge. At 7 P. M. there is to be a parade from the Odd Fellows' hall to the armory where a special meeting will be held at 7:30. Governor Fred R. Many of the Grand Officers are planning to be present also. A. T. Sherman lodge is expecting to send a delegation of forty or forty-five members, the majority of whom will make the trip in a specially chartered bus, the rest going in automobiles.

## Urge Sanitary District to Acquire Hoffman Dam Site

Howard C. Phillips of Winnetka Paul A. Hoffman of Wilmette, and F. L. Streed of Kenilworth, all of the North Shore Mosquito Abatement district, were members of a delegation which met with Sanitary board members last Saturday afternoon to urge upon that body the importance of acquiring the Hoffman dam at Riverside, now privately owned. The delegation represented a dozen cities and towns including the north shore.

The group, including mayors, engineers, Izaak Walton league officers and the like, told the Sanitary board members that the Hoffman dam served to form a cesspool of vast extent in the Des Plaines river, backing up sewage for miles, bringing about a dangerous condition and breeding mosquitoes. With another summer near at hand the delegates thought that action was imperative. They explained that under the present ownership, the dam could not be controlled, to flush out or hold back the river.
