Dr. Ernest Guthrie Addresses Society

Tells of Great Project Chicago Association of Churches Is Engaged In

Members and friends of the Woman's society of the Congregational church were given, last Wednesday, a glimpse of the great project the churches of the Chicago association are engaged in. Dr. Ernest Graham Guthrie, general director of the Chica-Congregational Missionary and Extension society, outlined the comprehensive survey his organization is making of the whole field. He showed maps to illustrate what has been learned about over-churched and neglected areas, and told something about the effect upon churches of the successive waves of population that have come and gone, thanks to such new understanding. The day of uncoordinated denominational enterprise is passing, and already the Presbyterians and Congregationalists have joined forces in the maintenance of neighborhood houses which serve as community centers of social and spiritual resources in the districts most needing such institutions. It seems most reasonable to suppose that a time is not far distant when the various denominations will so far have developed the spirit and the technique of co-operation that mutual reinforcement will supplant competition, and no neglected or overchurched areas will remain. This cannot come, however, until all recognize that more important than the extention of any ecclesiastical organizations is the building of the Kingdom of God, Dr. Guthrie emphasized. Dr. Guthrie is a man of wide outlook

and broad understanding and it is very fortunate indeed that such a man is the leader of the great work to which Victor Lawson bequeathed very ample resources.
