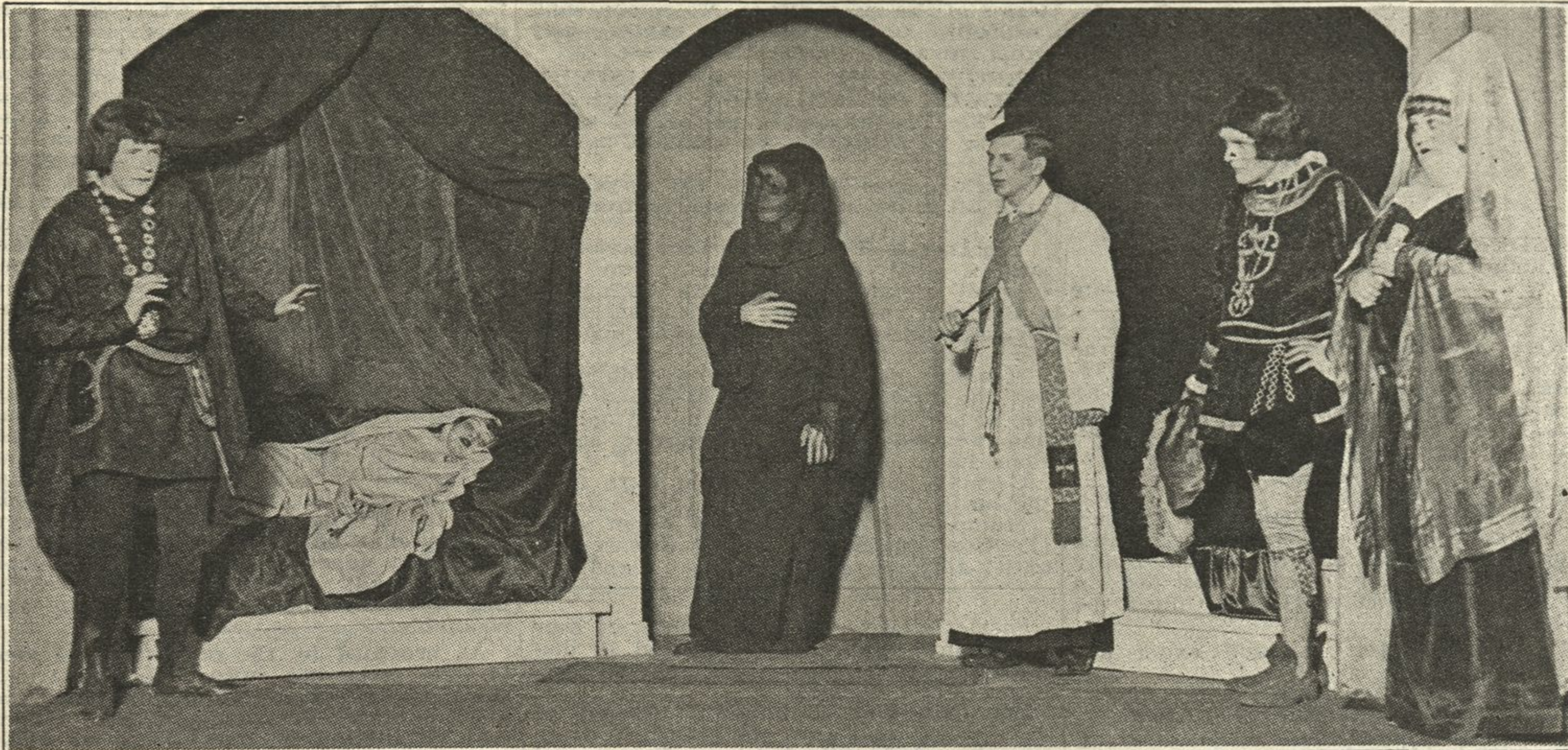


Two Scenes from "Everyman" Staged at St. Elisabeth's Church

The rhymed translation was used which would have been a difficult hurdle to surmount for less seasoned actors. However, the lines flowed easily and naturally and to say the players caught the spirit of the play is putting it mildly. Everything about the performance, the simplicity of staging, exactness of costuming, and the voice and gestures of the actors themselves, was expertly handled. The play is one that should be a part of everyone's cultural knowledge, since it was one of the first morality plays used to link up the scriptural and secular drama.
