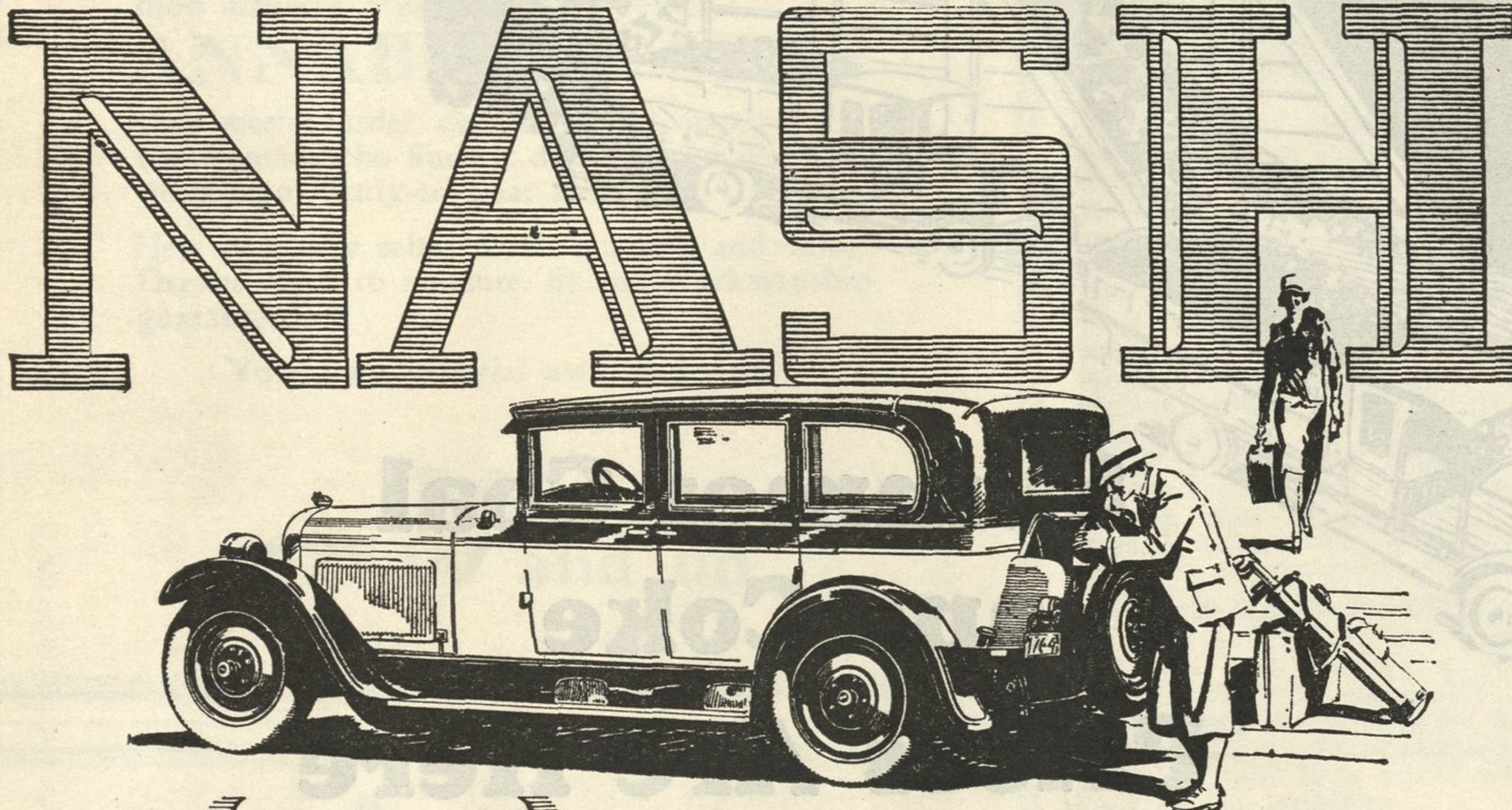
Suggest Retention of W. A. Shaw as Grade Separation Engineer

The special committee, composed of representatives of the various municipalities from Evanston to Highland Park, appointed for the purpose of working in the interest of the Villages toward grade separation, met at the City club in Chicago at noon last Wednesday.

A committee of the committee, composed of Henry F. Tenny of Winnetka, Winfred D. Gerber of Glencoe and Paul A. Hoffman of Wilmette, reported to the committee that they stood ready to recommend the retention of Walter A. Shaw by the municipalities in connection with the preliminary work that is necessary before the case can be brought up before the Illinois State Commerce Commission.

Mr. Shaw, it was pointed out, has been active in engineering work since 1891. He was for more than twenty years the engineer for the Ridge avenue and North Shore Park district. He was chief engineer for the intercepting sewers of the City of Chicago and later chief engineer under the commissioner of public works, Joseph Medill Paterson, during the term of office of Mayor Dunn of the City of Chicago. Immediately following this he became president of the American Engineering and Construction Co., from which office he resigned to become the engineer member of the Public Utilities commission under Gov. Dunn. He was reappointed and served during the term of Gov. Lowden.
