The Woman's World's fair opens Saturday, May 19, at 2 o'clock in the Coliseum, and lasts through the following week, exclusive of Sunday, 'until 10:30 Saturday night, May 26. Round trip fares on the Chicago and North Western, Illinois Central, Burlington, and other railroads in the Western Passengers' association, will be reduced to the amount of one and a half single fares for all passengers going to this fourth annual exposition. The special rates will provide for women in Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Iowa, Illinois, and Indiana.

Beginning Monday, May 21, the fair will open daily at 12 o'clock and continue until 10:30 at night.
