In a banquet attended by nearly 400 women, the convention reached its close Saturday evening when one of the principal addresses was made by Miss Emily Kneubuhl, executive secretary of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women.

Women have one of their greatest responsibilities at the present, an intelligent ballot in November, stated the speaker and pointed out that the 49,000 women of the national federation could control 2,000,000 votes in this country, a number more than large enough to control the election.
