

### To Start Tearing Down Shawnee Club On Tuesday, May 29

The May party, a dinner dance tomorrow evening, and a bridge luncheon on Monday, May 28, will be the last parties to be held by Shawnee Country club in its old quarters and will tax them to capacity. Tuesday morning wreckers will start demolishing the old clubhouse that has been a center of social activity in Wilmette for so many years. Time was when a handful of Wilmette residents used to follow the light of a lantern along a grassy path to parties in the first quarters of old Ouilmette Country club, but now cars arrive for club parties from points all along the north shore. Thursday evening was the occasion of the final buffet supper in the old quarters and the rooms were filled with members and their families.

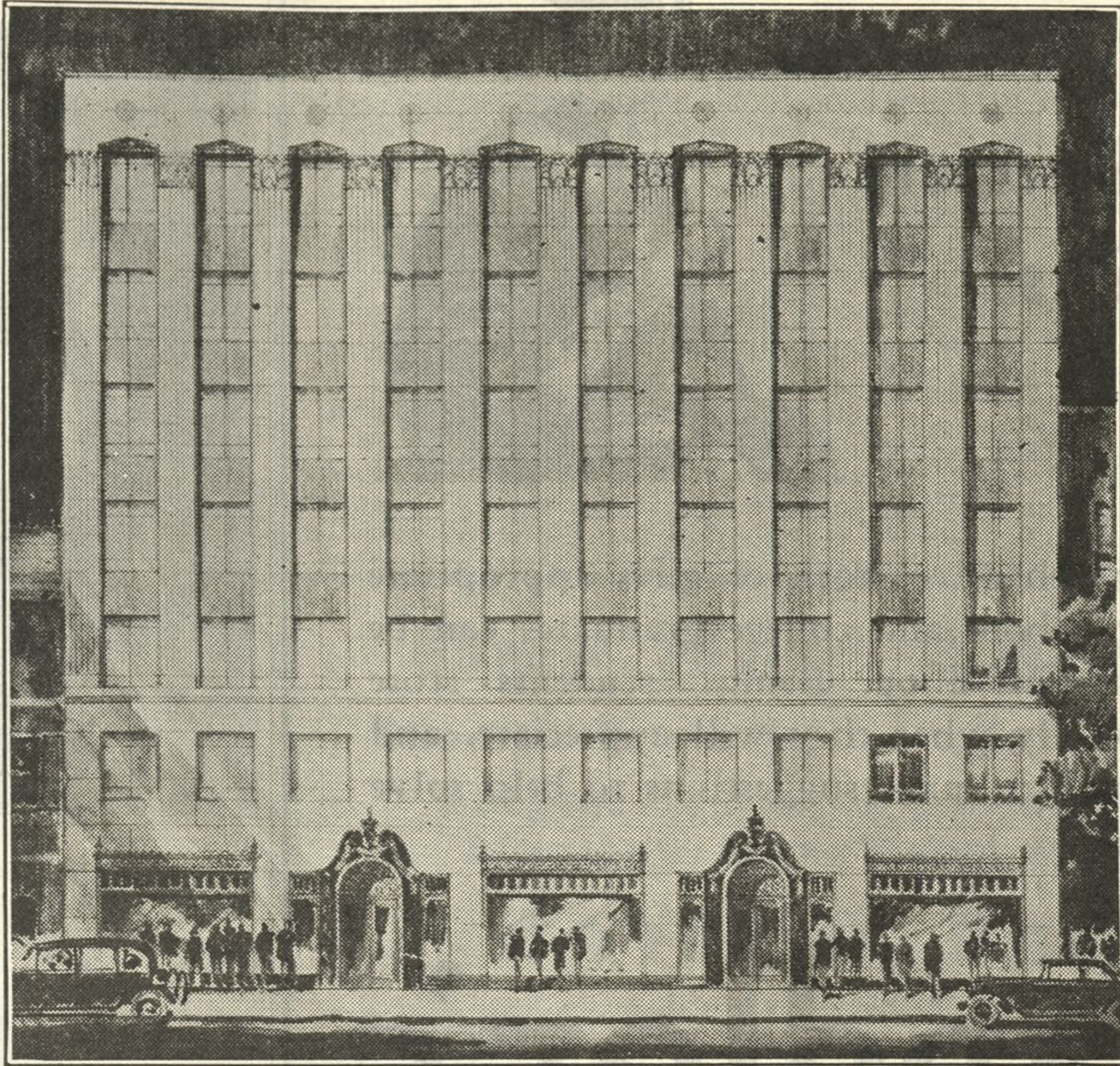
