Observer Describes Two Particularly Interesting Homes in Indian Hill Estates

Tudor-House and Farme-House in Indian Hill Estates have been charmingly furnished by The Catherine Reckitt's House and Garden Shops, Inc., of Evanston and Chicago, the lounge by Fred Leighton's Indian Trading Post, of Chicago.

In Tudor, there has been retained coherently the English Country House idea, providing those things that a traveler sees and wants for himself in English homes. Linens and simple sun-durable fabrics grace the windows—and the details have been carefully studied so that Tudor-House opens its hospitable doors as though its owners have been established within its walls for a comfortable number of years.

The Farme-House

In Farme-House the decorative treatment is beautifully harmonized with the character of architecture. This is neither New England nor the Middle West—simply the American farm house, lightly and pleasantly borrowing from the Connecticut, from the Federal American period, from 18th Century England—even from the French peasant, wherever the furniture of these several styles seems to suit a space. The whole is dexterously blended into a truly American atmosphere which, after all, is a melting together of international elements braced by a native sturdiness and good natured tolerance.

Attractive Gardens

Supplementing the interior decorations, the gardens of both homes have been embellished by the use of Habitant Cedar Fencing, Garden Furniture and accessories, illustrating the theory that home embellishment starts at the garden gate rather than at the front door.
