Miss Sandberg was driving south on Center street and the Walling boy was turning north on Center from Diller street when the crash occurred.

The boy was taken to the Evanston hospital by Dr. Frederick Christopher. It was found that one of his legs, a shoulder blade, and two ribs were broken. He also suffered severe body wounds.
