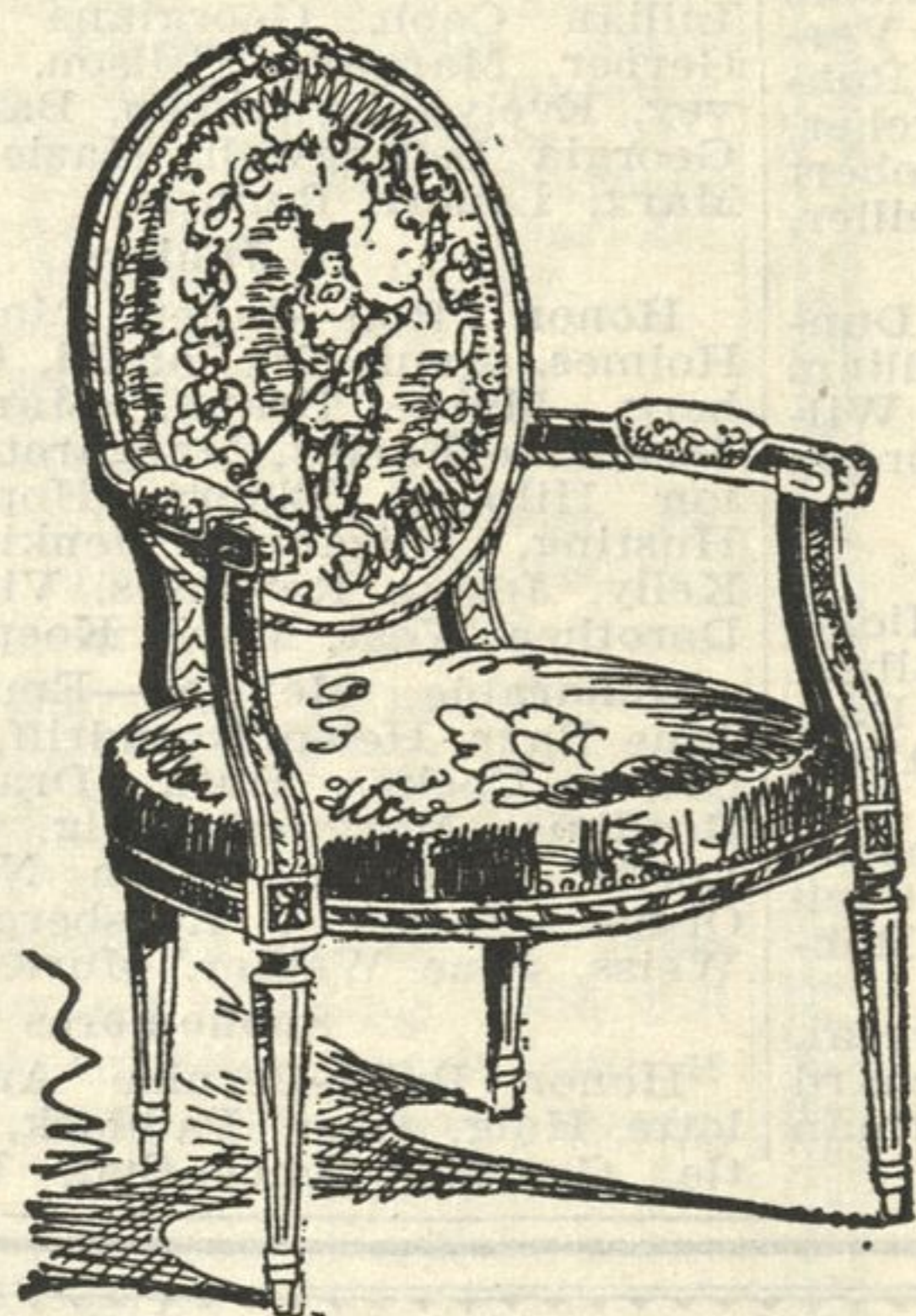

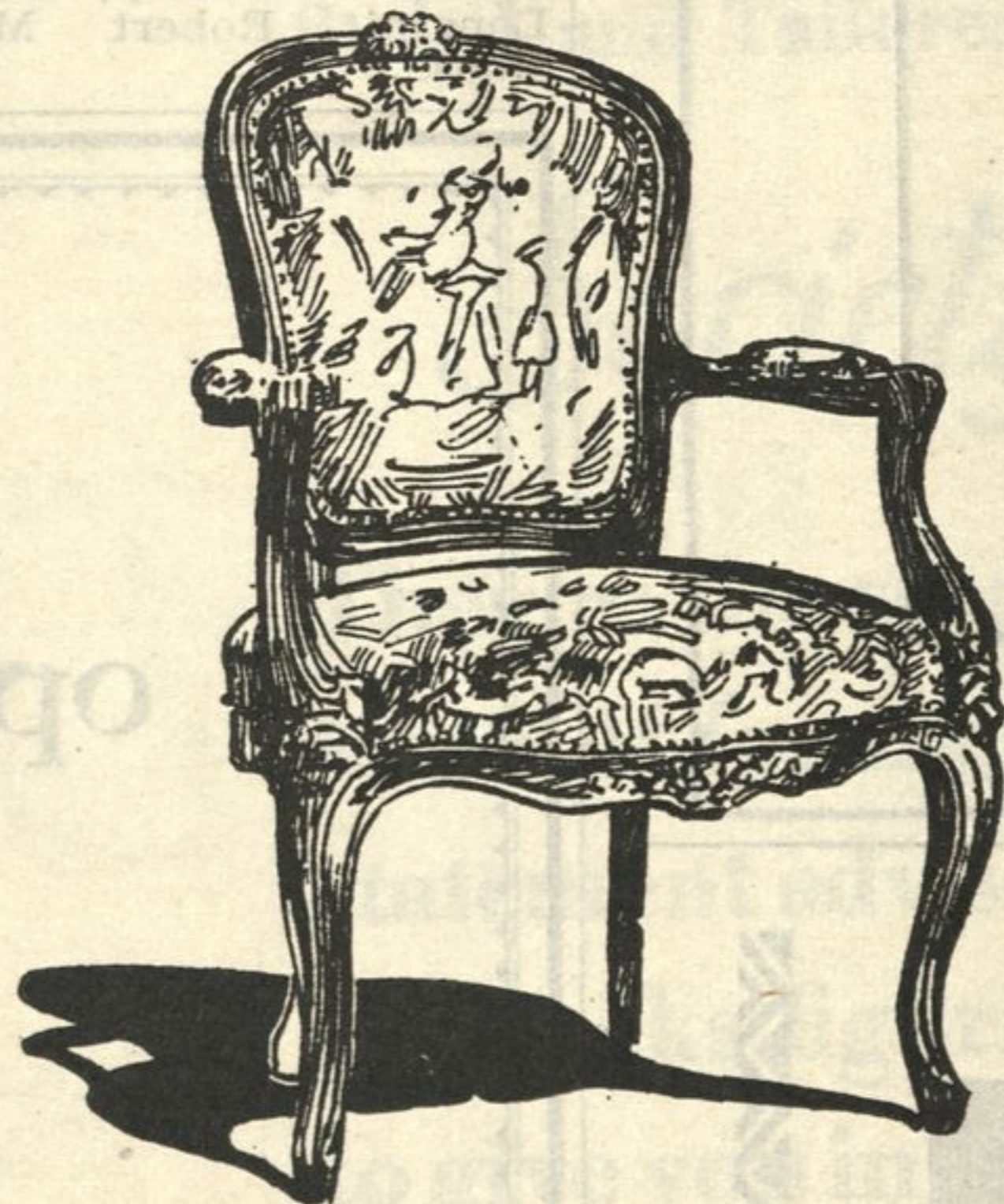
Shown above: A frame of exquisite design, copied from an old museum model, and a selection of covers in real needlepoint.

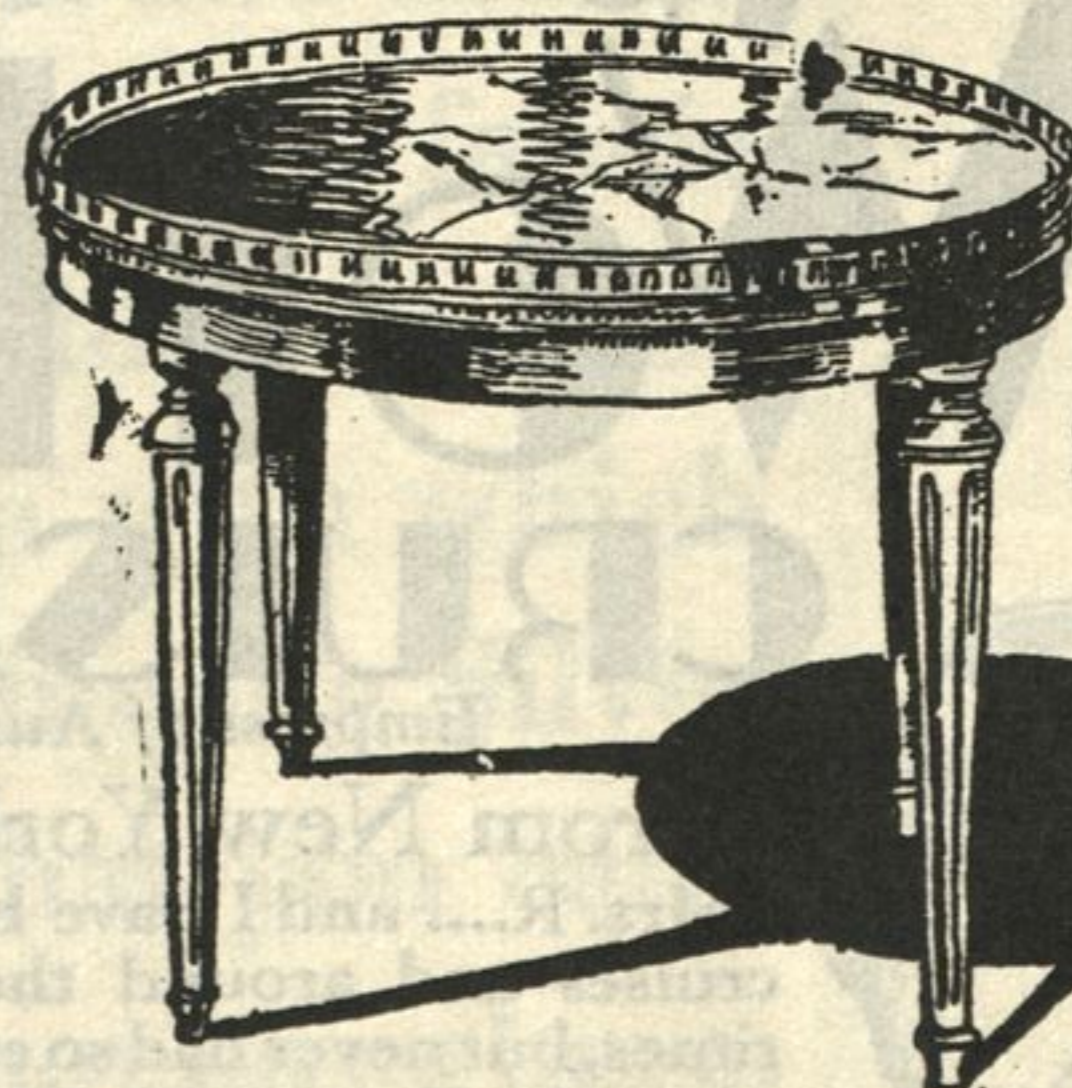
Benches in Needlepoint
