Trainman is Killed in Fall from Moving Car

A. Laufenberg, 27, of Highwood, collector on the Chicago, North Shore and Milwaukee railway, died at the Evanston hospital Thursday noon as a result of injuries received that morning when he fell from the northbound North Shore train number 511 as it was approaching Cherry and Ash streets, Winnetka.

The accident occurred about 7:30 o'clock when Laufenberg leaned out from the moving train to inspect the brakes, which were not functioning properly. He fell and sustained a skull fracture, a broken arm and suffered other bruises and injuries.

A wife and one child survive him.

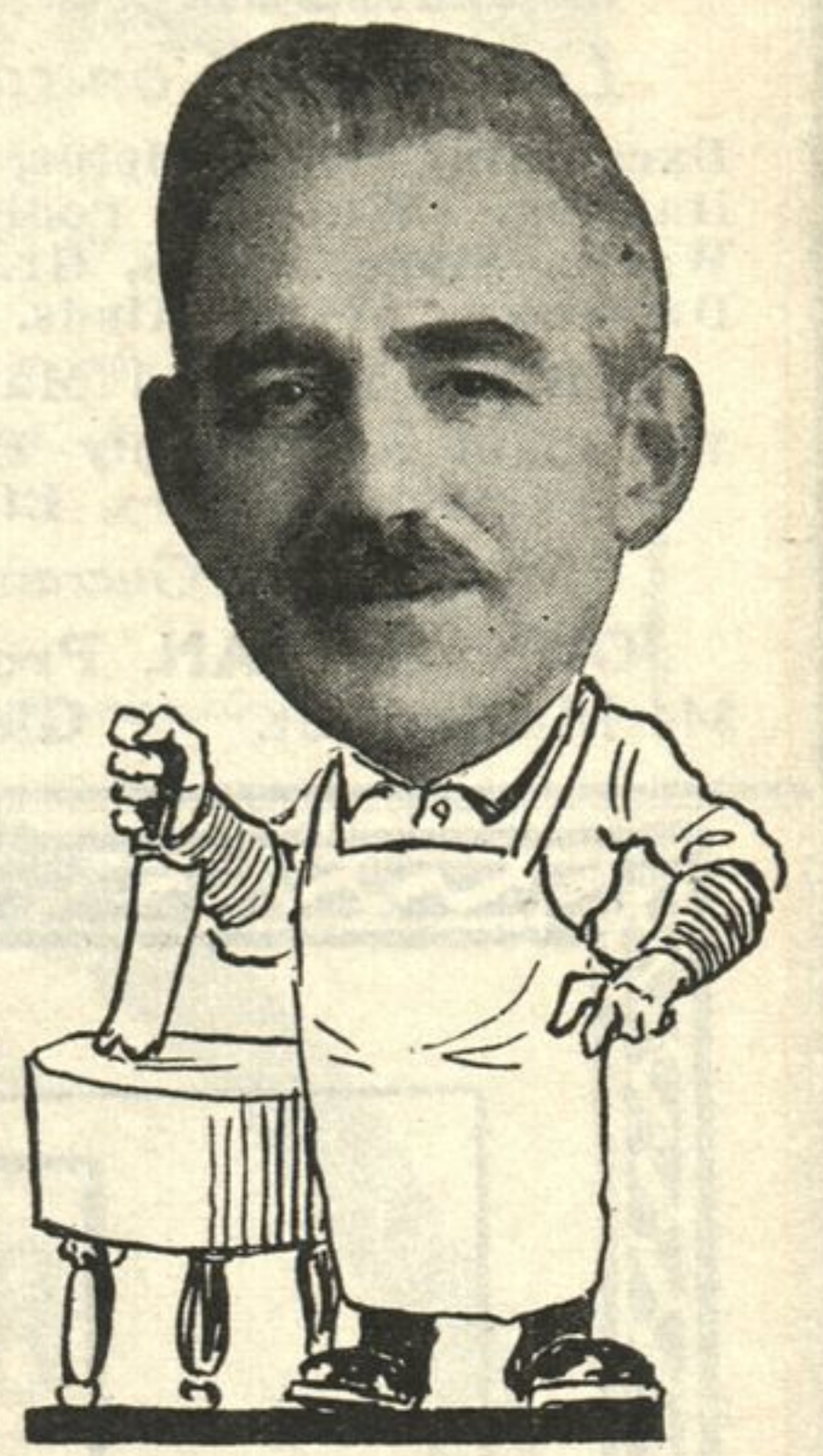
