### MacCracken Will Turn on Chicago Aerial Beacon

When Secretary of Commerce Herbert Hoover, Republican candidate for President, passes through Chicago Sunday evening, July 15, on his way to visit President Coolidge he will have an opportunity to observe what Chicago is doing toward its plans to make that city the world's largest airport.

That same evening is scheduled for the dedication of the Chicago Central Aerial Beacon on top of the Roanoke Tower, LaSalle and Madison streets.

This is the largest aerial beacon in the world and will be visible to flyers for a radius of 100 miles. It is located 520 feet above the sidewalk. The dedication will be held from the north steps of the Field Museum in Grant park and all Chicago has been invited to witness the ceremonies. Two bands, the Naval Band from the United States Naval Training Station, Great Lakes, Illinois, and Schiff's Aerial Beacon Band will play martial airs for the occasion. Planes from the National Air Transport Co., and The Grey Goose Air Lines will circle the beacons.

The exercises will start at 8 P. M. and the beacon light will be turned on at 9 P. M. by William P. McCracken, Jr., of Winnetka, Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Aeronautics. City, state and federal officials will be the guests of honor.
