ployed in the F. T. Richardson garage, who are charged with selling liquor, and F. T. Richardson, owner of the premises; Palmer Giambastian at Northfield for selling liquor; George Corrado Guastapalia, proprietor of the Hubbard Woods cafe, for selling liquor; Luther Kruse, colored porter at the barber shop in the Elm street station of the North Shore line, for selling liquor.

One "Miscreant" Missing

In each instance where warrants were issued for the sale of liquor the arrests were made following purchases previously made by federal operatives, according to the police. In the instance of the Wersted Motor company the prohibition squad came armed with a warrant for Edward Lyle, manager of the painting department of the garage, who was charged with having sold intoxicating liquor to investigators. Lyle was absent from the village on vacation at the time of the raid.

In a statement presented to WINNETKA TALK Thursday of this week William T. Wersted said:

"The Chicago papers have recently printed statements which have been very embarrassing to me, to the effect that intoxicating liquor has been sold and found in my garage. I wish to state that the inventory on the search warrant taken by the prohibition officers shows 'nothing found' and that to the best of my knowledge and belief there never has been any intoxicating liquor sold or stored in my garage."

Thus, the biggest front page police story in Winnetka since the notorious "speed trap" episode of a few years ago, which shook that department to its very foundations.
