Feature Tito Schipa

The romantic third act of "Martha" known as the "Hunting Scene" which

will present Tito Schipa in one of his finest roles, containing that splendid aria "M'Appari" which is one of opera's greatest lyric show pieces. Mr. Schipa has made it peculiarly his own, for with the cloying beauty of his tone, his interpretation and his ability to breathe the spirit of love and longing into a song, it might well have been written to the order of this tenor. It is proverbial in opera circles that whenever Mr. Schipa sings this aria, the performance must be halted until the audience has literally exhausted itself with applause. Mr. Schipa has other brilliant opportuni-

ties in this scene and Miss Florence Macbeth, who will appear in the title role, will sing the lilting "Qui Tranquilla" while Virgilio Lazzari as Plunkett has a fine song called the "Canzone del porter." Miss Gladys Swarthout will be heard as Nancy and Louis Hasselmans will conduct.

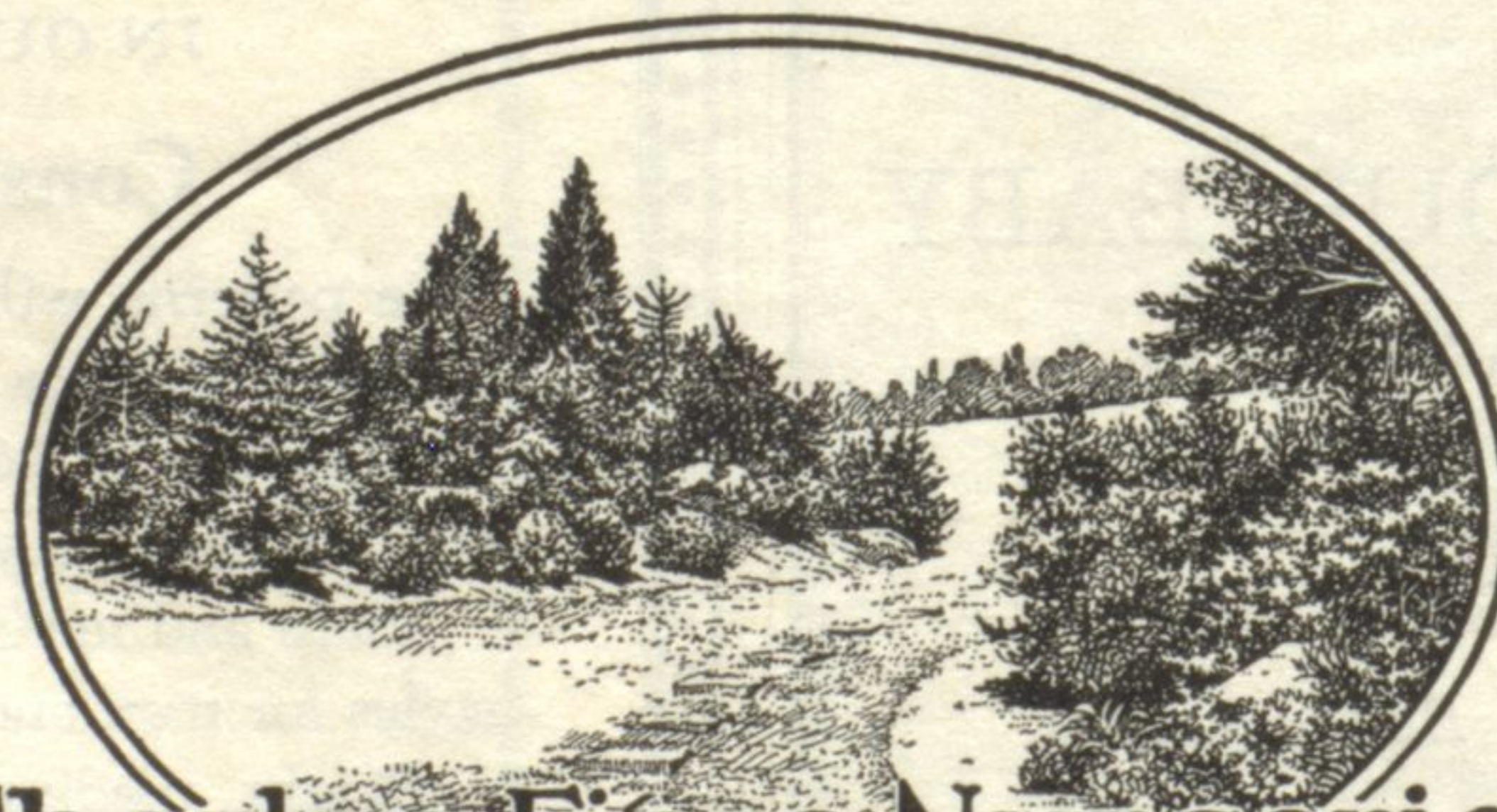
