There are several good end possibilities among the sophomores—Woodworth, Oliphant, Baker and Massey—who will undoubtedly see much service during the year.

Few promising linesmen can be found in the sophomore ranks and the major part of the gruelling work will probably have to be shouldered by the veterans, among whom are Hazen and Sinkler, tackles; Dart and Anderson, guards, and Erickson, center.
