Explains Function of Winnetka Organization of Which All Parents Are Members

1. To further co-operation between parent and teacher.

The more the teacher knows about the child, his home and parents, the more she can accomplish. It is a great advantage to the mother and father to know personally the teacher with whom their child spends so many hours each day. For many, the system is a little hard to understand. Frequent talks with the principal and teachers will clear up many difficulties.

II. The second object is parent education. Early in October, notices will be sent to every member of the association with a tentative program for the year. The second object of the Association is carried out by inspiring and interesting talks which will give an opportunity for both educational and social meetings.

Unnecessary Noise Now Constitutes a Nuisance Hereabout

The term "Nuisances" in the Winnetka Village code now has a much broader meaning than it did prior to the meeting of the Village council Tuesday evening, when an amending clause to the ordinance was passed.

It was introduced at a former meeting of the council by Trustee William B. Moulton.

The new paragraph, which will be known as nuisance No. 21, provides that "To produce, cause, or permit to be produced, in or upon any premises, any offensive noise to the disturbance of the peace and quiet of the persons residing in the vicinity of such premises," shall constitute a nuisance.

It was pointed out that it covers a multitude of possibilities but was admitted that the long time complaint of residents in the vicinity of the unloading tracks in the railroad yards was uppermost in mind.
