Auditors' sessions are to be held once a month, the first one perhaps not until late in October.

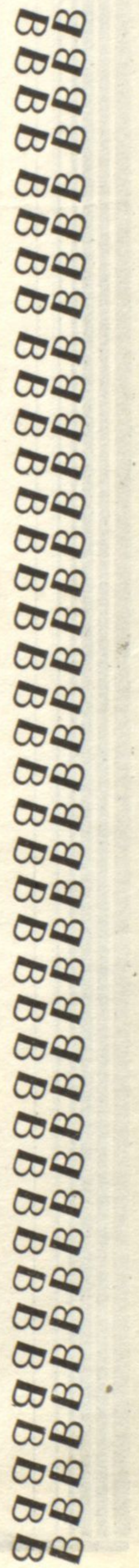
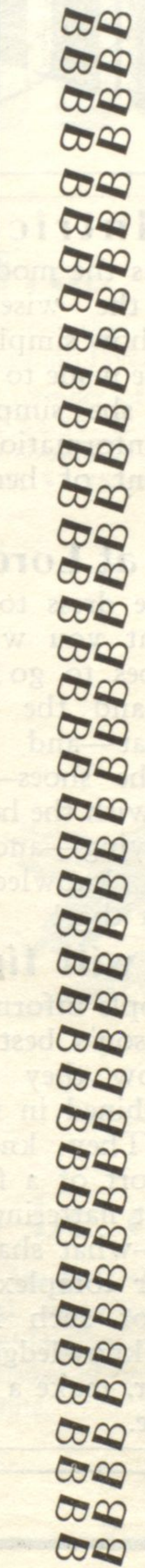
