Seminars, Classes Now Being Held for Winnetka Teachers

Classes in educational sociology, psychology, art, and dramatics for teachers of the Winnetka Public schools are now being conducted at the Skokie school and at the Community House. The various classes are under the direction of the following persons: educational scoiology, S. R. Logan; psychology, Miss Frances Dummer; art, Miss Alta Gahan, and dramatic art, Mrs. Frances Murray.
