

Critics Sing Praise of American Opera Company in Chicago

Everyone who read Edward Moore's praise of the opening performance of the American Opera company could not fail to wish to hear them. "They may be setting a dangerous, a revolutionary precedent," he writes, "but when you hear Marguerite sing the Jewel song in a way which does not in the least suggest a stunt of vocalism, but only a joyous outpouring of youthful spirits, you begin to wonder if Mrs. Rosing has not hit on something more important than all the expensive voices in the world." Mrs. Rosing has made it "natural and graceful and rhythmic," showing Faust is a drama as well as a musical score.

The American Opera company

decided some months ago to make its permanent home in Chicago. It is something distinctly new and distinctly American. It makes music drama of all the operas, combining all the arts in a single organized product. Furthermore, it uses the English language and one can easily understand. The artist's diction is so good and each word is given its proper value in such a way that the result is splendid. It offers a remarkable opportunity to educate young people in opera because they are able to understand, so that the performance will be more than just music plus pantomime for them. There is room in Chicago for several opera companies and competition only stimulates more interest.

The young students who make up the company have come from all over the country, although 10 percent are from Chicago. They are young, charming, and intelligent, and they can sing.

One young man returned here after studying in Italy four years, another came back from Paris. A young woman with Winnetka-connections was too late for the first tryouts but recently, after her voice had been heard, she was accepted but told that the budget had been depleted. She joined the company for experience and declares she has never known anything like it in all her years of study here and in New York.
