

NEW TRIER FUMBLES; LINDBLOM GAINS TIE

North Shore Gridders Miss Chance at Victory When Visi- tors Profit by Misplay

Febel saved Lindblom from defeat at New Trier's hands, at Indian Hill, last Saturday, when he picked up a fumble on the 45 yard line and sprinted to a touchdown that tied the score, 6 to 6. The game was an exciting one, with many errors and a poor defense for each team. There was a good deal of passing and kicking. Most of the passes were incomplete. Two-thirds of the invaders' passes failed and even more of the home team's attempts at passing were unsuccessful.

Most of the backfield men distinguished themselves; but Febel, Lindblom's big fullback, and New Trier's two halfbacks, Nelson and Bennie Richards, did exceptionally well. It was Bennie's first game but he played like a veteran.

Hunter Hicks, New Trier's quarterback, was the only "N" man to play the whole game. In the second quarter, Coach Ashenbach took out the entire first team, except for Hicks, and put the second team in its place. The second team played until the last quarter and although it didn't have the drive to score, it held the visitors scoreless too.

Soon after the kickoff, Lindblom, by a series of line plunges, steam-rolled down to the 8 yard line, where the New Trier line held them until Nelson was able to kick out of danger.

Nelson intercepted a pass and then New Trier began a drive that was successful. Richards gained most of the ground on line plunges and end runs. He and Nelson also completed two short passes. Richards hurled a third pass from Lindblom's 30 yard line and Nelson caught it and crossed the line for New Trier's touchdown. Rossitter was unsuccessful in his try for goal.

Lindblom made a triple fumble in the first part of the second half. A Lindblom back dropped the ball, a New Trierite caught it but fumbled and another Lindblom man got it. He lost the pigskin in the scramble and then a New Trier player finally got it and managed to hold on to it.

New Trier's first team replaced the second after Febel had broken through the line and raced 25 yards before he was forced out of bounds. Then Lindblom started another drive and came within 3 yards of a touchdown. The New Trier line became a solid wall on the 3 yard line. After two more downs the visitors had to surrender the ball and Nelson kicked out to their 45 yard line.

Lindblom tried to return the ball by the air; but Nelson captured it. On the next play New Trier tried a cross-buck, a back fumbled, Febel ran around and grabbed the ball and was off. Several frantic New Trierites caught hold of him but he shook them off and outdistanced his pursuers to the goal line, 45 yards away. He tried to win the game with the extra point; but his kick was blocked and when the game ended a few minutes later the score was still 6 to 6.
