

Plenty of Seats for That Illini- Hoosier Tussle

Desirable seats for the Illinois-Indiana football game in the Illinois stadium this Saturday will positively be available to all comers, even at the last minute.

The reassuring statement is issued by the Illinois athletic association in order that no fans may stay home for fear that they will not find accommodations.

Upwards of 30,000 people will cheer the Illini and the Hoosiers in their battle, which is the first big game of the season at Illinois. However, since the stadium capacity is double that number, it will be possible to take care of all comers.

Seats will be on sale at the stadium from Saturday morning on and visitors who desire may drive there immediately and obtain their pasteboards.

Among the throng who see the game will be some 3,000 fathers of university students attracted by Dad's Day. A varied program of entertainment has been arranged for the fathers and other visitors. Saturday morning Illinois and Notre Dame will meet in a cross country run. There will be mass meetings, concerts, an art exhibit and President Kinley's meeting for the dads.

Illinois is braced for a thrilling and close struggle with Indiana which plays the Illini for the first time in fourteen years. The Hoosiers, coached by Pat Page, have risen considerably in the football world and last year justified their claim to rank by holding Minnesota to a tie.
