Rifle-Revolver Club in Trophy Shoot Tomorrow

The "Two Hundred Yard Trophy" shoot of the Winnetka Rifle and Revolver club will be held Sunday, November 4, at the Fort Sheridan range, commencing at 10 o'clock, and lasting into mid-afternoon. In the event of steady rain, the shoot will be postponed until Sunday, November 11, it is announced.

Members have been asked to bring their own rifle and ammunition or use the club's Springfields and "issue" ammunition if they prefer.

The following conditions will govern

the event:

(1)—Match open only to members of the club; (2)—Range 200 yards, off hand, Standard "A" target; (3)—Any rifle with iron sights; (4)-Re-entry match with suitable fee to the club for each string of ten shots fired. No sighting or practice shots allowed, but an unlimited number of "strings" may be fired; (5)-Best string of ten shots wins the temporary custodianship of the trophy and entitles winner to have his name engraved on base; (6)—Contests for the trophy may be held not more than twice in any calendar year; (7)-Title shall remain in the club until trophy is won three times by one contestant, in which case title shall vest in such contestant; (8)-The determine any further rules respecting the trophy.

The "Two Hundred Yard Trophy" is heralded as a prize worthy of attainment, and as this will probably be the last outdoor shoot of the season, club officials expect a hundred percent turnout.


