Village officials wish to explain that this condition was caused by the reversal of flow in the mains, resulting from the Winnetka system being supplied for a few hours by the Village of Glencoe.

This was done in order to give the Glencoe plant a sufficient load to test out the capacity of the pumping equipment.

Arrangements have been made by the two villages whereby one is prepared to supply the other with water in case of emergency.
