

poration, discussed, "The Public Utility Company's Stake in Electric Power." He claimed that we owe a great debt to the men and companies who have done the hard pioneering necessary to bring this tremendous industry to the point of efficiency and comparative low cost of the present day from the time, only forty nine years ago, that the first incandescent light was developed.

Alvin C. Reis, a member of the Wisconsin Interim Commission on Water Power, talked on, "The People's Stake in Electric Power," and told of the findings of the Commission as a result of its investigation of government ownership. In Wisconsin where electric power is sold by private companies the rates average between 7 and 8 cents per kilowatt hour while in Ontario where the government supplies the power, it is sold at rates varying from 1 cent to 1.6 cents per kilowatt hour. This lower cost to the consumer the Commission found responsible for consumption equivalent to approximately 5 to 10 times more than in comparable territories supplied by private corporations for it encouraged the use of additional electrical labor saving devices in individual homes.

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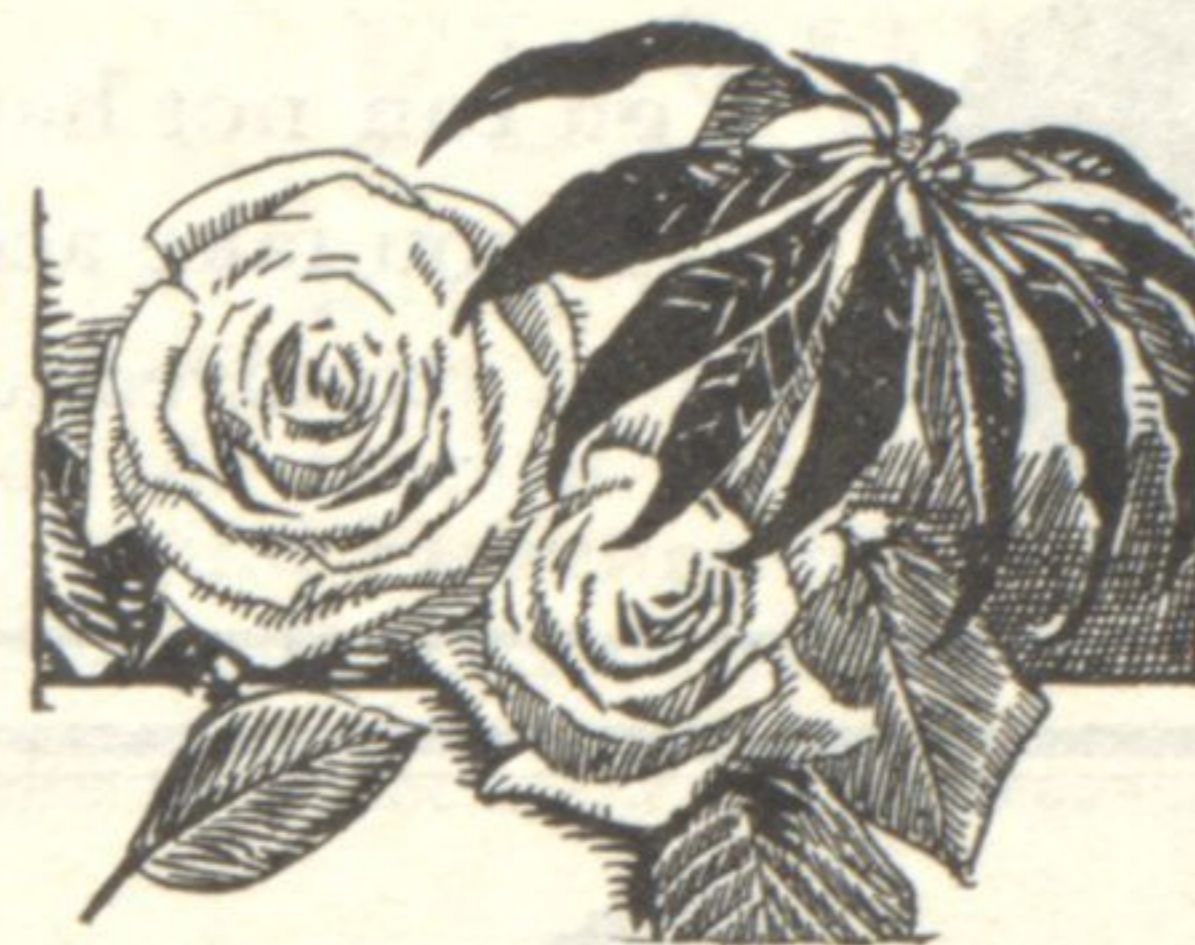


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
