A small-sized tornado visited Sand-wich East Monday afternoon, doing considerable damage, and ending with a hailstorm, with stones as large as walnuts. A barn belonging to Joseph Baillergen, near Wolf's roadhouse, was struck by lightning and burned to the ground, with a loss of \$300. A house owned and occupied by Joseph Langlois was unroofed, while his bathhouse was totally destroyed. Four young men had just returned to the bathhouse after a swim and donned their clothes were about to leave, when they sighted the storm. They remained under the shelter until the tornado unroofed the building and otherwise damaged it. Knowing of nothing else to do, they ran for the river again and jumped in, with their clothing on, remaining there until the storm had passed. They were about to come to shore, when the hail commenced to fall. A run was made for shelter under a tree. Louis Oulette, one of the young men, thought he would reach the home of Mr. Langlois in safety before the storm arrived, but he misjudged the force of the wind and had to seek refuge in a shed. The same section of country was visited by a tornado several years ago.
