STRANGE CASE OF SUSAN TIPPING.
She Sleeps for Seventeen Days and Puzzles
Physicians.
The Melbourne Argus gives details
of the strange case of Susan Tip-
ping, who had a long cataplectic sleep
at Gyneton. The girl's father, a
miner, says that he never found the
girl in any way different from other
girls, save that she was inclined to
be a little hysterical, and had only a
few weeks before declared to him
that she was growing afraid to go
out in the dark alone. He did not
think she had anything on her
mind, save that she had been
worried over the illness of her mas-
ter, the late Mr. William Barker.
The following is Dr. Duncan's ac-
count of the case:
"Susan Tipping, a servant in the
employ of the late Mr. William Barker,
a strong, healthy girl, 18 years of
age, retired to rest on the evening of
Sunday, June 14, in her usual state
of health. When her mistress called
her in the morning she met with no
response, and all efforts at awaken-
ing her proved futile.
"Thinking that she must presently
arouse from the stupor, Mrs. Barker
felt no concern during the day,
though she made several efforts to
awaken her. Finding her in the same
condition in the evening, however, I
was sent for, and on my arrival I
tried all the usual methods, none hav-
ing the least effect. On the following
day the girl was brought into the
hospital, and a most careful exami-
nation made.
"No symptoms of any disease were
discoverable, the pulse being regular
and quite normal, and the breathing
the same. The eyelids were firmly
closed, and on forcibly opening them,
the eyes were found to be turned up
and the pupils contracted, as in nor-
mal sleep. The whole attitude of the
patient was that of a peaceful and
healthy slumber. She was totally in-
sensible to pain of any kind. The
powerful galvanic shocks applied to
her night just as well have been ap-
plied to the bed on which she was
lying, for all the effect they had.
She was so thoroughly tested by
other methods as to absolutely pre-
clude any idea of malingering. This
state was recognized as one of genu-
ine trance or lethargy.
"As it was doubtful how long the
condition would last, measures were
at once taken to support her
strength and assure her comfort.
Feeding her by a stomach-tube pass-
ed through the mouth was first tried,
but had to be abandoned because it
caused vomiting. A small India-rub-
ber tube was then passed through
the nostril into the stomach. This
was connected with a longer tube,
with a funnel at the end.
"This method answered perfectly,
and was kept in use the whole time
the trance state lasted. Liquid nour-
ishment was simply poured into the
funnel in stated quantities. She was
fed at regular intervals in this fash-
ion with soups, broths, milk, liquid
peptonoids, and beaten-up eggs. She
was also given a stated quantity of
water at fixed intervals. In this way
her health and nutrition were per-
fectly maintained.
"Her trance terminated suddenly
on the seventeenth day, and her first
question, in regard to her mis-
sion, showed that her thoughts ran
practically in the same channel as when
she fell asleep."

Famous Vine in Royal Gardens.
While, in these days of widely dif-
fused knowledge in relation to the
production of grapes, many persons
find it difficult to obtain well ripened
clusters from comparatively young
vines, it is extremely interesting to
refer to a great vine planted 129
years ago and bearing a crop of
some 1,000 bunches, the berries finely
developed and as black as stoes.
This grand old vine is growing in
the Cumberland Lodge portion of
the royal gardens at Windsor, and is
known as the Cumberland Lodge
vine. It is one of the descendants of
the famous vine at Hampton Court,
which was planted 139 years ago,
and it has outdistanced its venerable
parent in dimensions, in vigor and in
productiveness. Occupying a great
glass structure 120 feet long by 20
feet wide, it spreads its luxuriant
branches over a roof area of 2,400
feet, which is fully one-third greater
than the area of the house occupied by
its venerable parent at Hampton Court.
For so large a vine 1,000 bunches,
weighing in the aggregate 1,500 lbs.,
is not a heavy crop, but the grapes
are in every way befitting the royal
table, and to overtax the strength
of so old a vine would be unwise.—
Gardeners' Magazine.

WAIFS IN AUSTRALIA.
The State Finds Them Good Homes
and How No Orphanage.
Australia is a continent without an
orphanage, a country without an or-
phan. Each waif is taken to a recep-
tacle house where it is cared for till a
country home is found. The local vol-
unteer societies canvass their neigh-
borhoods and send to the children's
committee of the destitute board the
names of any families they have
found where children may be placed.
The children's committee selects the
home which it judges is best adapted
to the development of the child in
question.
No child is placed in a family so
poor that the child might suffer. The
foster parent receives a sum averaging
\$1.25 per week for the care of the
child and for proper clothing. When of
school age the child must be sent to
school. The local volunteer committee
looks after its care and culture, and
zealous neighbors often assist in watch-
ing the growth and education of these
happy children.
When the child is fourteen years old
he begins to work. His earnings are
placed in the Postal Savings Bank, and
at the age of seventeen or eighteen he
goes out into the world an independent
man. The state, at an expense of less
than \$70 a year, has raised a man or
woman to contribute to its wealth and
prevented the manufacture of a crimi-
nal and the expense of courts, prisons
and reformatories.
