**COUNTY COUNCIL.**—The County Council is in session this week in Toronto. Reeve Sanders went in on Tuesday and expects to be absent till Friday or Saturday.

**HOME AGAIN.**—Mr. John Bartholomew and party returned on Saturday with nine fine deer. Capt. John Button and his party have also returned but without such good success, having bagged only one deer.
