

NEWS SUMMARY.

The Toronto World has offered that paper free for one year to the person who makes the nearest guess to the population of Toronto as shown by the census which is being taken this week.

The official returns have not been announced yet, but a rough estimate shows that in all probability the present population is between 160,000 and 170,000.

M. de Lesseps announced to the Panama Canal shareholders last night that the new bonds had been taken up and the project was saved from collapse.

The Rev. W. F. Wilson appeal case occupied nearly all day Wednesday at the General sessions. The case went to the jury, who disagreed and were discharged, necessitating a new trial.

Mr. Sol. H. Jeffery of Kinsale intends holding a grand school concert on Friday-December 14th to raise funds for the purchase of a library before leaving that school.

Rev. Newton Hill of Markham preached the anniversary sermons at the Collier St. Methodist church, Barrie. He on Sunday last, gave an address at the entertainment on Monday evening.

The Barrie Gazette is fearfully exercised for fear that a salaried Police Magistrate will be forced upon that rising town. To make good his case the editor has to admit that the population has decreased to less than 5000.

The Judicial Committee of the Privy Council gave judgment yesterday in favor of the Province in the case of the Ontario Government v. the St. Catharines Milling & Lumbering Co. upholding the decision of the superior court, the Court of Appeal and Chancellor Boyd.

New Year's day will be celebrated by Old 01 by a temporary retirement behind the friendly moon, probably for the purpose of quietly turning over a new leaf, the same as the rest of mortals, and for the purpose of adopting a new series of resolutions for 1899. The retirement here will come so late in the day that it will not be visible at all, and New York state, where the sun will set an eclipse, will be the easternmost place where the sun's performance will be visible men. The eclipse will be on at sunrise for our neighbors, the Aleutian islands, and thus they will have a rare opportunity for a late nap, for it will be dark with them after sunrise. From that point on the surface of the earth the line of the centre of the eclipse will sweep southward and eastward across the Pacific ocean, and will land on our western shores to the north of San Francisco. Across Nevada, Idaho, and Montana the line will fall till it ends away up in Canada where there is nobody of consequence to observe it. It is expected that the results which will be gained by the observations of this eclipse will be better than have ever before been secured from any like event.—Boston Herald.
