**TORONTO STREET MARKET.**  
From Thursday's Globe.  
This market was quiet to-day, and prices steady. About 200 bushels of wheat offered and sold at \$1.06 to \$1.07 for fall, \$1.07 to \$1.08 for red winter, \$1.08 to \$1.10 for spring and 87 for goose. Barley ensler, with sales of 250 bushels at 44c to 54c. Oats are steady, 200 bushels selling at 35c to 38c. Peas sold at 66c to 69c for 150 bushels, the latter price being paid for seed peas. Rye is quoted at 60c. Hay at \$16 to \$18. Straw, sold at \$9.50 to \$10.50 a ton. Dressed hogs \$0.78 to \$7. Beef, \$8.50 to \$5.50 for forequarters and \$7.50 for hindquarters. Mutton, \$7 to \$8. Lamb, \$9 to \$11. Veal \$7.50 to \$9.

## ROUND ABOUT US.

**NOTES GOT BY HOOK OR BY CROOK WITH SCISSORS OR PEN IN HAND.**

The York Tribune was out with a special edition on Wednesday last on election matters.

Uxbridge's new post office was opened on Monday of last week. The Journal says the interior is "slick."

The revivalists Crossley and Canfield commenced revival services in the Methodist Church, Uxbridge, on Sunday last.

The body of Seymour Porter the book-keeper who disappeared on New Year's day was found in the Don on Tuesday morning.

Edward Kelly, of Winnipeg, will play Mr. Fleming, of Markham, at the latter place for the checker championship of Canada on April 27.

In a single house in W. T. Junction there were two corpses on Tuesday last, that of J. P. Ross aged 70 and Mrs. Graham of Aurora. In the same house Mrs. J. Ausman, a niece of the former lies helpless with paralysis.

Miss Mackelcan, the Hamilton lady who had been missing since Monday, 1st inst., was found on Saturday last, hiding in a disused brick kiln in the outskirts of the city. It is stated that her mind is astray on religious matters.

The Speight Mfg. Co. of Markham is in voluntary liquidation. Mr. Alfred Boulbee subscribed \$1000 stock just before a general election and now attempts to evade the payment by questioning the legality of the company.

An attempt was made to rob the express office at Indian Head, on Saturday morning, by a masked robber but was outwitted by the coolness of the night operator Ross, who blew out the light and chased the robber with a revolver.

It is said the revising barrister at St. Thomas refuses to sell voters' lists for Scott Act purposes for less than six dollars per copy. A few elections would have the effect of leaving him quite at his case so far as money matters are concerned.

The first town council of West Toronto Junction was elected on Monday last as follows:—Mayor Clendenen, Reeve Armstrong, Deputy Reeve Laughton; Councilors Royce, Gilbert, Hayden, Bull, Marr, Greenwood, Gillespie, Lapp, Spears, Gurd.

Loes, the man who committed the burglary in Clarendon a couple of weeks ago and who was so cleverly followed and captured by Mr. J. Bundy and Constable Reynolds, was sentenced last week by Judge Burnham to six months in the Central Prison.

Hon. J. C. Rykert, M. P., "The man from Lincoln," is having a lively time explaining to his Orange supporters, why he voted against Col. O'Brien's amendment, and "what he meant" by saying that he "voiced the sentiments of nine tenths of the Orangemen of Ontario."

Sir Charles Tupper was in Toronto on Friday last, to be examined by Hon. Ed. Blake in connection with the Oudronk suit against the C. P. R. Sir Charles left for Winnipeg on Friday evg. He travels in "the private and official car" of the Intercolonial Railway. The papers do not state who pays the fare.

Rev. J. J. Dobbin, Presbyterian Minister of East Caledon, charged with an unnatural offence, was tried at Brampton on Saturday last, and was completely exonerated from the vile charge. On his return to East Caledon his friends turned out en masse and headed by a brass band carried Mr. Dobbin in a chair to the Manse, where he made a short speech thanking them for their kind reception.

The voting on the repeal of the Scott Act took place on Thursday of last week and resulted in the repeal of the Act in the fifteen counties where it was tried; viz.—Ontario, Northumberland and Durham, Peterboro, Victoria, Lincoln, St. Thomas, Guelph, Kent, Brant, Lennox and Addington, Carleton, Lanark, Wellington, Frontenac and Colchester N. S. The majorities ranged from 800 in Frontenac to 1500 in Kent. The majority against the act in Ontario county was about 600.
