## TORONTO STREET MARKET.

From Thursday's Globe.  
The receipts of grain to-day were small. Wheat steady. 1 load of old fall sold at 90c, and 1 load of new fall at 85c. Oats steady, 200 bushels selling at 33c to 34c. We quote—New, red winter, and spring nominal at 83c to 85c; goose 83c; Barley, surely nominal; Peas 57c; Hay steady. 24 sales of 20 loads at \$10 to \$13.50, 1 load of old hay sold at \$15. Straw dull and firm, 1 load selling at \$11.50. Dressed hogs \$7 to \$7.25. Beef \$3 to \$5 for fore-quarters and \$5.50 to \$7.50 for hind-quarters. Mutton \$6 to \$8; Veal \$4 to \$5 per carcass.

About one o'clock on Saturday morning, Glover's livery stables, Bowville were found to be on fire. The frame shed in which it was discovered was burning in three different places, coal oil having been liberally used. Fortunately, by the use of hand grenades, it was quickly subdued. The people had only quieted down when the fire bell again rang out its alarm. This time the incendiaries were more successful. The large sheds and stabling of W. P. Power, deputy reeve were a mass of flames. The buildings and contents, comprising twelve tons of hay, two valuable horses, a Gladstone, a buggy, and a quantity of furniture, were totally destroyed.
