The receipts of grain to-day were small. Wheat firmer, one load of new fall selling at 86c; the best fall wheat is worth 90c; red winter and spring nominal at 85c; goose, 78c. Barley easier, one load selling at 41c. Oats steady, with sales of 7900 bushels at 32c to 33c for old and 30c to 31c for new. Peas nominal at 60c, and new rye at 50c. Hay steady, with sales of 18 loads of new at \$10 to \$13; old hay at \$15. Straw easier, with five loads selling at \$9.50 to \$10.50. One load of loose sold at \$7. Dressed hogs, \$7 to \$7.25. Beef \$8 to \$8.50 for forequarters and \$5.50 to \$7.50 for hindquarters. Mutton, \$6 to \$8. Veal, \$5 to \$8 per carcass.
