PICKERING COUNCIL.

The Pickering council met pursuant to adjournment on Monday, October 21st, 1889. Members all present. The Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Several accounts were presented for payment. Communication read from John Ball Dow re claim of Thos. Madden for gravel taken from part of lot 9, con. 5, Twp. of Pickering. Petitions presented from Thos. Moody and 14 others asking aid for Patrick Tool, from Dr. E. J. Freeland and 16 others asking aid for Mrs. Devitt. A resolution passed by the Local Board of Health re stagnant water on Mrs. Ryan's property at Pickering village, was laid before the council. Com. read from Asst. Commr. of Crown Lands re appointment of W. E. Yarnolds Esq., P. L. S. to make survey in 8th con.

On motion of Mr. Parker the Reeve left the chair for half an hour and resumed.

Moved by Mr. Gerow, seconded by Mr. Westgate that all contractors tendering for grading or graveling in this township in future, and in case same be accepted, do furnish bonds or other security that the same will be completed according to contract and within the time specified; and that the above be added to the list of rules and regulations. Carried.

The Standing Committee on Sheep killed by dogs recommended through the chairman, R. R. Mowbray, that W. W. Bunker be paid the sum of \$16 being two-thirds sworn value of three sheep killed by dogs. On motion of chairman report was adopted.

The Standing Committee on Roads and Bridges recommend payment of various amounts for work done on township roads.

On motion, Mr. John Phillips was heard in reference to building a house for shelter of the Stark family.

The Standing Committee on Contingencies reported and recommended payment to Clark Bros. for printing 1600 collector's receipts, \$4.75; Sylvester Mackay, for selecting jurors, \$5; D. R. Beaton, selecting jurors, \$10; F. A. Beaton, selecting jurors, \$5. Also an allowance of 75 cents per week until 31st December, for Mrs. Devitt; and an allowance of \$1 per week until December 31st, for Patrick Tool, indigents. That the committee re Stark house receive an additional grant of \$10, but expenses must in no case exceed this sum.

Moved by Mr. Westgate seconded by Mr. Gerow that Richard Burt be and is hereby appointed overseer of highways in Road Division No. 16 to fill vacancy caused by the death of the late Geo. Leng, and that the seal of the corporation be attached thereto. Carried.

Mr. Parker seconded by Mr. Gerow moved that Mr. Westgate attend in the interests of this municipality at the engineer's inquiry re drain near village of Pickering. Carried.

Mr. Westgate seconded by Mr. Mowbray moved that this council do now adjourn and stand adjourned until Monday, the 11th of November, to meet at 10 o'clock a. m., for the transaction of general business. Carried.
