### CLUBBING RATES.

The visit of Henry George, the social reformer, to Toronto last night comes in quite opportunely with the discussion that the "single tax" is receiving at the hands of debating clubs and conventions at present. Some measures are absolutely necessary for the equalization of the burdens of taxation and Henry George's theories are received with great favor by a majority of his hearers wherever he goes. He has recently returned from a tour of Great Britain where he received much attention, especially in Scotland.

ALL eyes are turned towards Lambton where an important bye-election is pending, and the first three-cornered contest in which the new Third Party has taken a hand is to be decided. The seat was made vacant by the Hon. T. B. Pardee, and has gone Liberal for a number of years. The temperance element will enter strongly into the contest and as the Third Party candidate is necessarily pledged to support prohibition legislation in the house it remains to be seen to what extent men are prepared to sacrifice other principals to their desire for the abolition of the liquor traffic. Meanwhile the three parties are working hard for the election of their candidate, and the result will be anxiously awaited by the leaders.

MR. Geo. F. Marter has learned, in rather an expensive manner, that the Mayor of Gravenhurst has a torably good idea of the law on Voters List business. Mr. Marter applied to the Court of Revision to have some names placed on the list under the Manhood Franchise Act, which the Court refused to do, holding that this was the County Judge's work. Mr. Marter then applied to the Mayor to call the Court together, which he refused to do, on the same grounds. He then carried his case to Osgoode Hall where he applied for a writ of mandamus. On Wednesday judgement was rendered by Judges Street and Ferguson to the effect that the Court of Revision should have heard his appeals, but failing that he had a "complete, appropriate and convenient remedy" by applying to the County Judge. People shouldn't fool with the law.
