sion it was resolved by a vote of seven teen to thirteen to support its petition tofthe Legislature to secure its charter ind tax exemptions. The By-laws and Legislation Com-

mittee presented its report soon after the opening of the session, and approved the motion submitted on Monday. to the effect that the Council petition the Government and Logislature to grant the company incorporation and exemption from taxes on its right of way. The Council went into Committee of the Whole to discuss this, Reeve of any remarks I may have made, which Stephenson in the chair, Reeve Evans. suggested that they might as well approve the scheme, inasmuch as it had no chance whatever of being carried out. Deputy Reeve John A. Macdonald resented this, and proclaimed his faith in the project. Reeve Humberstone and Reeve Tyr. Il both supported the scheme, the former citing the immense advantages accruing to York County, and the latter telling of his efforts almost halt a century ago to secure the building of the canal . A good deal of dicussion ensued, much attention being bestowed upon the tax exemption clause. Finally it was proposed to strike out this clause, and this amendment was defeated by a vote of seventeen to thirteen. The committee's report was then carried. Arrangements were made for the annual dinner, a committee being ap pointed to further the same. At the afternoon session Reeve Cane of Newmarket moved that a committee be appointed to take into consideration the cost of criminal prosecutions. He thought them altogether too high. Reeve Humberstone was rather neutral. He admitted that accounts frequently have had to be rejected or cut
