Where the panel in the case of a grand jury does not exceed thirteen, seven out of their number may find a true bill. This amendment to the Criminal Code of the Dominion came into force on Jan. 1st, and applies to every province of the Dominion.

Hon. Clarke Wallace arrived at Toronto Junction from Ottawa on route to his home at Woodbridge. At the Junction the board led a sleigh to drive to Woodbridge with his son, Thomas Wallace. The horse became frightened at a house, which was being moved at the top of the Black Creek hill near Weston, and ran away down the hill at a terrific speed. The occupants of the vehicle controlled the horse for a time, but finally ran against the bank, overturned the sleigh and threw both occupants out with great force. The Controller was bruised considerably on the side and face, but his son escaped without slight injuries.

On January 1st inst., the province of Ontario was increased by the addition of the new county of Nipissing. By some oversight provision was not made for either county town or sheriff, and there being no sheriff in the county, judge could be installed. Either North Bay or Mattawa will be the county seat. At present court is held both at Mattawa and at the seat of the district.

The schedule of the returns of convictions before justices of the peace for the county for the quarter ending December 12th 1894, has been published, and shows there were one hundred and fifty-three convictions during that time. Of this number 41 were for disorderly conduct, 28 for trespass, 16 for vagrancy and 18 for assault. The balance is made up of injury to property, bicycling on sidewalks etc. The amount of fines imposed was \$410.00, of this amount \$101 remains unpaid.

Eugene V. Debs and other members of the American Railway Union, now in goal at Woodstock, Ill., under judgment of the Circuit Court of the United States for the Northern District of Illinois for contempt of court, will be admitted to bail in the sum of \$9,000 each, conditioned on abiding the further order of the Supreme Court pending the decision of the court upon the application for their release on a writ of habeas corpus. The order of the court was announced to day by Chief Justice Fuller. The writ against the Circuit Court, to show why the writ of habeas corpus should not issue, will be argued on Monday, March 25.

Consumers of oranges should beware of frozen fruit coming from Florida. An orange specialist in Florida says that frozen oranges are poisonous and dangerous to the public health. Notice such an embargo has not yet been given, since the report of a freeze in Florida. At this gentleman says that not only have the orange groves and the vegetable gardens been seriously injured and in many instances wholly destroyed, but even in the extreme south of Florida the cocoanut trees and the pineapples have been seriously injured, and in some places killed by the frosts.
