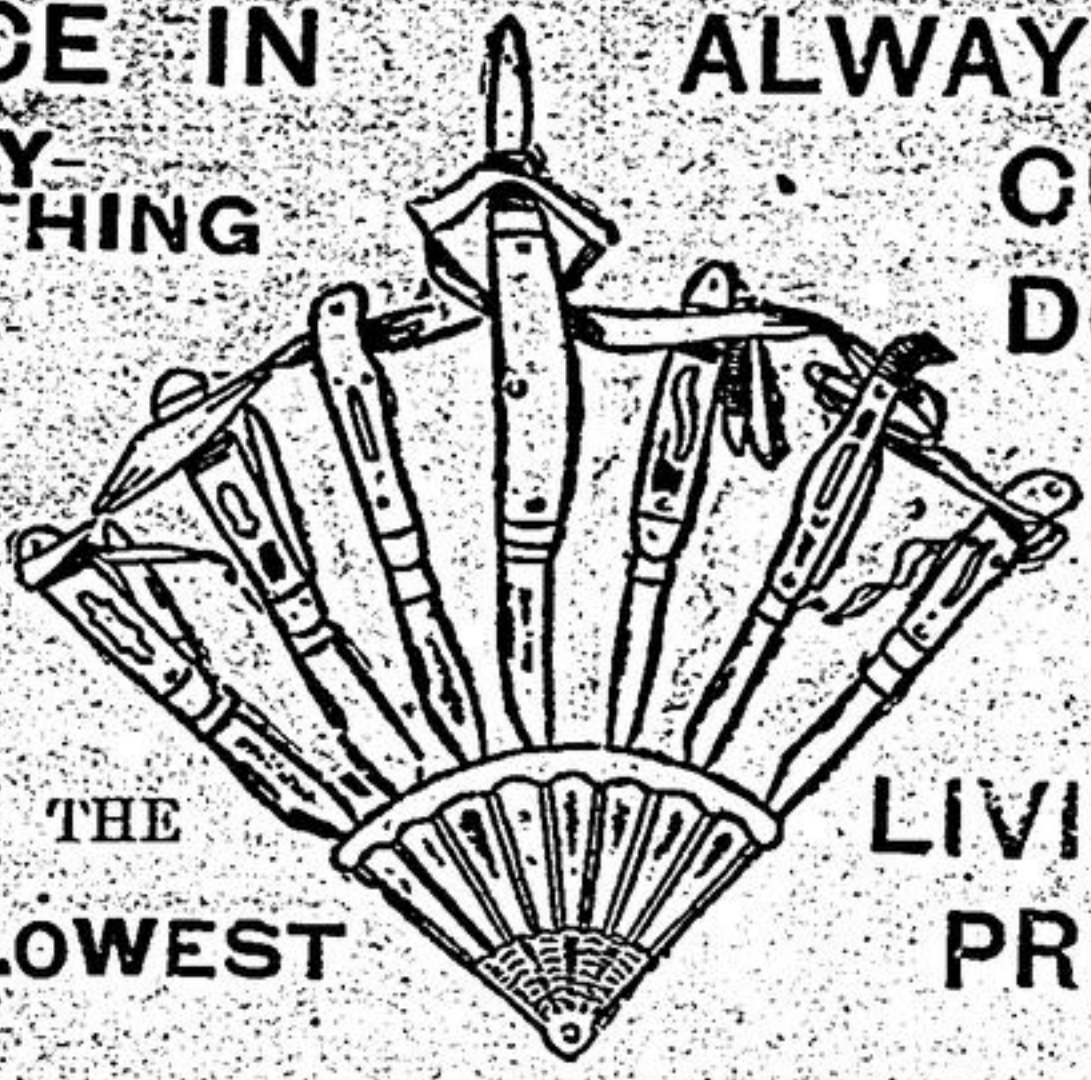

It is rarely, even in cases of death from ptomaine poisoning, that the elusive ptomaine has been discovered in succeeding examinations. Chemical agents are discovered known to indicate the presence of ptomaines but the skilled chemist has found at the end of long and careful analysis that somehow the putrefactive alkaloid has decomposed, evaporated or been destroyed by a reagent he used. The fact that the poison is of putrefactive origin gives weight to the precaution that food to be harmless must be absolutely fresh and prepared with the greatest care, and in this consist all the safeguards possible against ptomaines.
