The half-yearly statement of the Sovereign Bank of Canada has just been issued and is highly satisfactory. The loans and discounts have increased by \$2,300,000, the note circulation is up to the legal limit, the deposits show an increase of \$2,800,000 while the assets now amount to 100,000, as compared with \$7,200,000 a year ago. The strength of the bank is shown in the large amount of immediately available assets, which are equal to over 50 per cent of the deposits, while the cash balances amount to \$1,214,000, or about the amount of the bank's total note circulation.
