Members elect met at Vandorf Hall Monday, Jan. 10th, and after subscribing to declarations of qualification and office resumed business as Council for the year 1916 with Reeve Spaulding in the chair.

The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

Applications were presented from J. A. Clarke for assessorship, and Frank Steckley for collectorship for 1916. Refunds of dog tax were claimed by John Monkman for second dog destroyed before Court of Revision, and T. W. Stephens overcharge on account of error in assessment.

Bills were presented from W. J. Woodcock for work on roads, \$100 and Accident Ins. Co. premium on Treas. bond, \$12.00.

The Treasurer was instructed to pay the bills presented; to refund to John Monkman the sum of two dollars dog tax, and to T. W. Stephens one dollar dog tax, and to order six copies of the Municipal World, 1916, for use of Council and clerk.

The Reeve was authorized to procure stationery for the use of the Council and officers.

A resolution was passed authorizing the payment by the Standard Bank of cheques drawn by the Treasurer as instructed by resolution or by-law of Council, or Statute of the Province.

Reeve Spaulding was appointed commissioner for Eagle St. and T. H. N. west of the 5th con.

Deputy Reeve Moorhead, for T. L. N. east of 16th con.; Councilor Legge for Yonge St. and T. L. S. west of 4th con.; Councilor Russell for T. L. S. east of 4th con.; and Councilor Baker for Marsh Bridge.

By-Laws were passed appointing the following officers: J. A. M. VanNostrand and J. M. Grove, auditors; J. A. Clarke, assessor; Frank Steckley, collector; Dr. S. L. Freel, M. O. H. H. P. Smith, V. S., member of the Board of Health; A. B. Haines and E. Barnes, Sanitary inspectors.

Council adjourned to meet at 6 o'clock on Feb. 19th.


