#### PLANT A VEGETABLE GARDEN THIS SPRING

French II	A garden sixty by one hundred feet should produce sufficient vegetables for a family of ten persons, and leave some surplus for storage for winter. Cultivated by hand, it will occupy most of the spare time of a city or town dweller. A man cannot be a motor car or baseball enthusiast and at the same time make a success of a garden of this size. However, even smaller plots, if intelligently handled may be made to yield an astonishing quantity of good crisp vegetables, which have not lost their health-preserving value in the store window. Where the space available is small, crops should be selected that take but little space and give quick returns. Potatoes, cabbage, corn, egg-plant, peppers had better be dispensed with, and the space devoted to such things as peas, beans, spinach, lettuce, carrots, beets, tomatoes.


