MAJOR PINK
220th York Rangers, Overseas
Bn. C.E.F.

Major W. G. Pink, who is sec-
ond in command of the 220th
York Rangers Overseas Battalion
can boast his connection with
the County not only in military
matters, but in family ones also.
His grandfather was in business
and held the position of Post-
master in the village of Holt,
East Gwillimbury Township, for
the space of forty years. The
same village was the birthplace
and home of his mother. Again
his wife was born in the village
of Weston. He himself was born
in Muskoka.

He is a member of the Park-
dale Lodge No. 510 A. F. and A.
M., and also belongs to the S. O.
E. He is a member of the retail
Merchants Association. He
was first gazetted as Lieutenant
in the 12th Regiment, York Ran-
gers, on the 8th of April, 1912,
and attached to the Company un-
der the Command of Capt. B. H.
Brown, who is now commanding
officer of the 220th Battalion. In
April 1915, he was promoted to
the command of D. Company, the
North Toronto Company. Since
his first appointment he attend-
ed every training camp at Niag-
ara and took all his qualifica-
tions at the same place. From
September to December, 1915, he
held the position of acting Adj-
utant of the Depot Battalion,
which was stationed at the Arm-
ouries. On the first of December
he was transferred and taken on
the strength of the 127th York
Rangers as Junior Major. On the
first of March, he obtained furth-
er promotion when he was trans-
ferred to the 220th York Rangers
with the rank of Senior Major.
With such rapidity has he climb-
ed the ladder of military fame
and distinction, and in doing so
has not only achieved high honor
for himself, but has won the es-
teem and respect both of his brother
Officers and the men under
his command. He looks every
inch a soldier, and his looks are
corroborated by intrinsic quali-
fications of a similar nature. The
220th Battalion is lucky in hav-
ing Officers and soldiers of the cali-
bre of Lt. Col. Brown, and Major
Pink to take command. Their
connection in point of color, is a
symbol of the close ties of a
long friendship and comradeship.
This is an invaluable asset to
the Battalion they are in com-
mand of, betokens of a surety per-
fect control and efficiency, which
are of such priceless importance
when the Battalion takes its
place in the firing line, and mean
success as well as safety to the
troops. Major Pink received his
education in the Public School
and High School, and on leaving
school entered the leather busi-
ness. At the present time he has
a large Shoe Emporium at 278
College Street in the city of Tor-
onto, which is in charge of a
Manager during his period of ac-
tive service.

Council tries to get Cemetery Property

Stouffville Council met on Mon-
day evening May 1.

Mr. W. A. Silvester gave the
report of a special committee
composed of himself and Mr. N.
Rae, appointed at a special meet-
ing of the Council, to interview
Dr. S. L. Freel for the purpose
of securing a peaceable settle-
ment of the Cemetery question. The
committee was authorized to offer
Dr. Freel twelve hundred doll-
ars for the property lying im-
mediately to the south of the pres-
ent Cemetery property. Mr.
Silvester stated that Dr. Freel
would not sell this property but
would consider an offer for the
property lying north of the Cem-
etry. There was a thorough
discussion of the vexed question
A motion by Messrs Lehman and
Reaman, that the Council offer
twelve hundred dollars for the
property, was lost and an amend-
ment by Messrs Ratcliff and Rae,
that the Council offer one thou-
sand dollars instead, was carried.
The property referred to compre-
ses the land immediately north of
the Cemetery, and extending to
the orchard on the north and in-
cludes a strip on the south cor-
ner running to the Tenth Con-
cession.

On the motion of Messrs Rea-
man and Lehman it was decided
to proceed at once with the side-
walk west on Main Street oppo-
site Mr. Lamplough's and south
from Main Street to Mr. Brillin-
ger's house.

A communication was read
from the Toronto General Hospi-
tal asking maintenance of one
dollar per day for Mr. Johnson.
