Highway Inspection in Markham

The Highway Commission of Markham Township will make a thorough inspection of the roads in the Township next week. Owing to the recent flooding of the Little Rouge River, which inundated hundreds of acres of farm lands and washed away numerous culverts and small bridges, the roads in Markham are said to be in a worse condition than they have been in many years. In several places bad washouts have occurred and the roads have been badly undermined by the floods. These have been the cause of a number of accidents and several letters have been received from indignant farmers threatening the township with damage suits unless immediate steps are taken to repair the highways.

While making the tour of inspection the commissioners will pay special attention to the condition of the damaged culverts. It is estimated that to replace those already washed away will cost hundreds of dollars and it is the intention of the commissioners to commence work restoring them immediately. Upon the conclusion of the trip it is probable that estimates will be asked from local contractors for the work.

OBITUARY

Mr. David Moyer of Dixon's Hill, Markham Township, died rather unexpectedly after a short illness.

He was a son of the late Abraham Moyer Sr. He was born near Berlin in 1844 and died April 25th, 1916 aged seventy-one years and five months. His first marriage was to Sarah Eby who died in Maryborough Township in the spring of 1880. Later he was married to Fanny Wideman of Markham. He is survived by his widow and six children, Mrs. Bolender, Mrs. Raymer and Mrs. Wideman by his first wife and three sons, Harvey, Roy and Lloyd by his second wife, also four brothers Isaac, Samuel and Abraham of Berlin and Moses of Toronto. Two sisters, Mrs. Eby of Berlin and Mrs. Moyer of Breslau, survive him also. All of these relatives were present at the funeral.

He spent all his life on the farm and was known as an active and successful farmer. He was a kind and Christian father a good neighbor and highly respected by all who knew him. As a young man he farmed the old homestead for several years and then moved to the Township of Maryborough but during the last thirty-two years he lived on his beautiful farm where he died.
