For some time the columns of The Tribune have been used by the Board of Health and the Library Board to bring before the public the aims and benefits of these institutions. This progressive step is one that no doubt be followed by many other towns and villages in Ontario. There is no better way in which the interest of the people can be aroused to the benefits of these important institutions. The local newspaper is in this way made to serve an important educational function.

There has been discharged from many of the Battalions that have been in training for several months, a large number of men pronounced physically unfit. From the 116th Battalion alone, over have been sent home for this reason. It is a strange thing that these men have been permitted to train for all these months at an expense to the country of about ninety dollars a month per man. This money is absolutely thrown away. If these men are physically unfit now it is reasonable to expect that the majority were physically unfit several months ago. We can understand how a few cases could be easily overlooked but the number is altogether too large. It is obvious that the initial examinations have been superficial. This is a matter that ought to be remedied. Now, when men are sorely needed on the farms and in the factories it is most unfortunate that these men should be needlessly withdrawn from productive labour.

**Sudden Death**

The town was shocked Tuesday morning to hear that W. H. Brownscombe, boot and shoe merchant, had died early that morning. He had been as well apparently, as usual the day before, and retired Monday night without any signs of illness or weakness. Towards five in the morning Mrs. Brownscombe noticed him breathing heavily and tried to rouse him but without success. Everything possible was done to resuscitate him but by the time a doctor arrived he was dead.

Mr. Brownscombe was born in Port Hope sixty-six years ago, being a son of James Brownscombe who came from Devonshire England. After spending thirty-five years in business in Port Hope he came to Uxbridge and has conducted a store here for the past eleven years. He was an honorable business man, methodical and careful, and of a quiet serious nature, taking no part in public matters but attending strictly to his own affairs. He is survived by his widow and four daughters: Mrs. Fred Crosby of California, Misses Clara, Jean and Elva. Interment will take place in the family plot in Port Hope. The bereaved ones have the heartfelt sympathy of all their friends. —Uxbridge Journal
